Attendance was 74 a Sunday School.

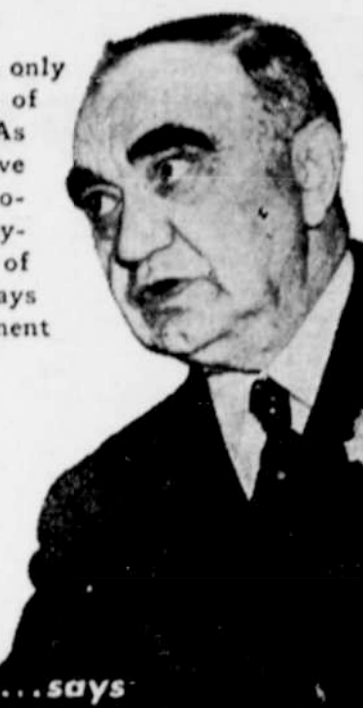
Byron Britch placed in two entries at the amateur auditions held in Hillsboro Friday night. Billy See was selected as a tap dancer.
