



DO YOU "MEASURE UP" TO STANDARD?

Do you "measure up" as a good cook? Accurate measure may be your measure of success! Wrong measurement may be your measure of failure! Wrong measurements may cause you tears.

For instance, just in making a cake; too much flour will make it dry and heavy; too much fat will make it greasy; too much sugar will give it a hard crust; too much liquid will cause it to fall! So it goes.

ON THE LEVEL

Always, always use level measurements. The recipes in modern cook books and leaflets and in columns such as this one, give recipes calling for level measurements. The recipes calling for level measurements except when noted. Have accurate equipment for measuring; a measuring cup holding one-fourth a quart and divided by ridges into thirds and fourths; a quart measure divided into fourths, each fourth measuring a cupful; a standard tablespoon (holding one-sixteenth of a cup) and a standard teaspoon holding one-third of a tablespoon.

This little chart may help you to figure out equivalent measures:

- 3 teaspoons—1 tablespoon
- 4 tablespoons—1 cup
- 5 1/3 tablespoons—1 1/2 cup
- 8 tablespoons—1/2 cup
- 10 2/3 tablespoons—2/3 cup
- 12 tablespoons—3/4 cup
- 16 tablespoons—1 cup
- 1/2 cup—1 gill
- 4 gills—1 pint
- 2 cups—1 pint
- 4 cups—1 quart
- 2 pints—1 quart
- 4 quarts—1 gallon
- 8 quarts—1 peck
- 4 pecks—1 bushel
- 16 ounces—1 pound

HOW TO MEASURE

Measure flours (except whole wheat and bran) after being sifted once. Never tap the cup or pack flour in with bowl and spoon. To measure half-spoon—

fuls level full and divide the contents lengthwise with a knife. Hold cup so that mark to be reached is on a level with the eye. Measure dry ingredients before fats, fats before syrups. And remember about those level measurements, except when noted!

NORWAY RABBIT

- 2 lbs. butter
- 2 lbs. flour
- 2 cups milk
- 2 teaspoons mustard
- Salt
- 1 can smoked sardines
- Paprika
- 1 lb. American cheese chopped fine

Melt butter in top of double boiler. Add flour and seasonings and blend well. Add milk and cook until slightly thickened. Add cheese and stir constantly until melted. Chop sardines, and add to mixture. Serve at once on hot buttered toast.

EASY ORANGE ICE CREAM

- 3 cups fresh orange juice
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup cream, whipped
- 2 cups thin cream

Mix sugar and orange juice thoroughly; add thin cream. Pour into trays of automatic refrigerator and freeze to a mush; then add whipped cream, mix well and continue freezing until firm.

BANANA CUSTARD TARTS

- 2 tbsps. flour
- 3 tbsps. sugar
- Dash of salt
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 cup milk, scalded
- 1/4 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup whipping cream
- Sliced ripe bananas
- Tart shells

Use ripe bananas—yellow peel flecked with brown. Mix together flour, sugar, salt and egg yolk in top of double boiler. Stir in milk slowly. Cook over boiling water until thickened, stirring frequently. Cool. Add vanilla. Chill thoroughly. Just before serving, whip the cream until stiff and fold into.

custard. To serve fill tart shells 1/2 full of sliced ripe bananas. Cover with custard cream filling. Garnish with additional banana slices.

BRAZIL NUT SPONGETTES

- 2 tbsps. butter
- 2-3 cup sugar
- Salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind
- 3 tbsps. flour
- 1/2 cup chopped Brazil nuts
- 3 tbsps. lemon juice

Melt butter, stir in sugar and salt and well beaten egg yolks. Add lemon juice and rind. Stir into the flour mixed with the Brazil nuts. Add milk and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into six greased custard cups and bake in pan of hot water in moderate oven (375° F.) 45 minutes.

WHO WROTE IT?
"Shine On Harvest Moon"

Oh, shine on, shine on



MANY of the American songwriters of this era began their careers as interpreters of song, as singing waiters or vaudeville artists. The composer of "Shine On Harvest Moon," native of Philadelphia, began as a blackface artist. He wrote his own songs and patter, and developed both talents until the fateful day when with Nora Bayes he sang his most famous song in the Ziegfeld Follies. The ovation to the song rather than to the male singer sent him over the borderline from acting to songwriting. He wrote a London revue, whose premier was marked by a Zeppellin raid. Our composer then went back to America, trouped with a vaudeville act, married his pianist and made a series of short films in Hollywood in the pre-double feature days.

The early song hit was picked up recently by a little orchestra in Texas, where Ruth Etting heard it and gave it added lustre in later renditions, and so, after twenty years the song again became a hit.

During the years the composer wrote many other numbers, including "Smarty," "Good Evening Caroline," the lyrics to "Take Me Out To The Ball Game"—enough to earn him membership in the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers.
