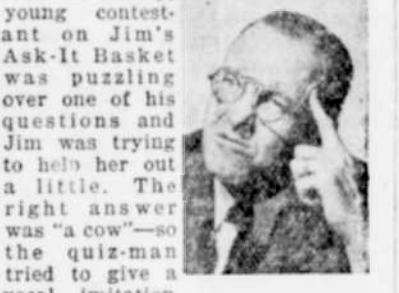

FIRSTS, OR WHAT?

Word from Germany says that Hitler youth are hard as nails and physically fit. Ready to conquer the world. As for us, we would not see our young people taken over by the government and taught war; yet as patriots we are bound to ask—Is the Young America now in high school and college to stand first or where?

The American Youth Survey state of Maryland, covering 13,528 youths, ages 16 to 24, city and country, black and white, boys and girls, gave 52.9 per cent drinking. The girls had 42 per cent imbibing while the country towns and rural from which we get our leadership showed 46 per cent drinking. "More than half the boys (52.4 per cent) and over a third of the girls (38 per cent) who were under 21 reported that they drank." So we see now and then, more or less, a lot of juveniles getting started. "Not long ago Dr. Paul Studensky of New York University made a survey of 2,379 young people in the state of New York. 83 per cent of these reported that they drank." These two surveys at least show the present trend. Of 581 colleges in a national survey 393 reported increased drinking. In a summary Roy Berg, Executive Secretary of Allied Youth gives "Upper classmen drink more than lower." So the appetite grows.

Nations have sprung up, grown rich and soft and sunk down before this. But America is young in years; she should be rugged and virile for long yet. Yet already we see creeping in the signs of countries

that sink. As they come and go; as they rise and fall; how does it all add up?
