



APPEASE JUNE APPETITES IT'S CONTINENTAL

Food for conversation is Biscuit Tortini — that little frozen dessert served in fluted paper cups—the proud invention of a French chef, which we've adapted for our own party menus!

2 egg yolks
2/3 cup white corn syrup
2 teaspoons gelatin
1/4 cup water
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup macaroon or toasted vanilla wafer crumbs

1 cup heavy cream, whipped
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon almond extract

Soften gelatin in water. Beat egg yolks until light. Bring corn syrup to a rolling boil, stir into softened gelatin. Pour immediately over beaten egg yolks, stirring until smooth. Cool thoroughly. Add flavorings and salt. Fold this mixture into whipped cream; pour into small paper cups and dust with crumbs. Place cups in freezing trays of refrigerator. Do not stir while freezing (2 hours).

ETHEL'S ORANGE ICE CREAM

Ethel says: "No April Fool in," you don't whip the cream to make one of the quickest and smoothest ice creams on record. The orange juice provides the flavor and the refrigerator does the work. Try this at your next party: Mix together thoroughly 2 cups of fresh orange juice and 1 cup heavy cream, sweetened to taste with powdered sugar. Add 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Pour into one deep or two shallow trays of refrigerator and freeze at low temperature until firm—about two hours. 6 servings.

GREAT SUMMER WITH SALAD

It's salad in the Summer time—in the ordinary course of events!

1 teaspoon onion juice
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 cup sliced Brazil nuts

2 cups cottage cheese
1 bunch radishes
1 bunch watercress
1 bunch lettuce
French dressing
Stir onion juice, Worcestershire sauce and 1/2 cup of Brazil nuts into cottage cheese. Pile in center of a shallow salad bowl or large platter. Surround with greens and garnish with radish roses. Sprinkle remaining Brazil nuts over cheese, and pour French dressing over greens.

"...AND EVERYTHING NICE"

Bananas and spice and everything nice, are those novel little cup cakes with the creamy banana baked right into the batter. Top them with a swirl of banana frosting and serve them proudly.

2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla

1 1/2 cups ripe bananas (4-5) Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt and spices. Beat shortening until creamy. Add sugar gradually and continue beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition until fluffy. Stir in vanilla. Add flour mixture alternately with bananas, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until it is smooth. Turn into well greased cup cake pans. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) about 25 minutes. Frost with Banana Butter Frosting. Makes 18 medium size cup cakes.

BANANA BITTER FROSTING

1/2 cup mashed ripe banana
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter
3 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar

Mix together bananas and lemon juice. Cream butter well. Add sugar and bananas alternately, a small amount at a time, beating until frosting is light and fluffy.

Milk A Mainstay Of Farm Income

ABILITY of the dairy industry to maintain cash payments to farmers for milk and employee payrolls is evidence, says the Milk Industry Foundation, that this 3 1/2 billion dollar industry is a mainstay of agricultural and industrial purchasing power during periods of recession.

Milk, the largest source of farm cash income, was also the only major farm commodity except cotton to return farmers more cash in January than the same month of 1937. Farm cash income from milk of \$132,000,000 for January was the largest for the month in eight years and 14.3 per cent greater than in January 1937. Total farm cash from marketings of all other farm products was down 10 per cent.

Total farm cash income from milk for the twelve months of 1937 was

\$1,475,000,000, an increase of \$58,000,000 over 1936 and \$490,000,000 greater than the low of 1932. An important factor in the steady increase of dairy farm income results from the axiom that farmers benefit most from milk sold in fluid form to homes, stores, hotels, restaurants.

Foundation reports from 136 markets throughout the country show that payrolls of milk companies were 4.3 per cent higher and employment down only 1.3 per cent in January 1938 compared with January 1937.

Further evidence of the importance of fluid milk distribution to economic stability is that despite curtailed business activity during the last quarter of 1937, milk company payrolls increased 4.3 per cent and employment .7 per cent over the last quarter of 1936.
