COFFEE WEEK TO START

Chilly and delicious all summer long, iced coffee gets the proper honor due it during a week all its own—National Iced Coffee Week, June 25th to July 1st! It's time to repeat those basic rules for really good iced coffee!

Make your coffee fresh and hot and double strength, for iced coffee; pour the hot brew directly over ice cubes or crushed ice in tall glasses. Serve with sugar and plain or whipped cream. If you like, make coffee ice cubes—pour freshly-made coffee into the cubes of your automatic refrigerator and freeze as usual; then brew your coffee regular strength (since there is no dilution by the ice in this way). New this year are special "toppings" for iced coffee—whipped cream flavored with spices or orange rind; ice cream (vanilla, chocolate or coffee); orange ice! Iced coffee will help you make the heat bearable!

A SCUMPTUOUS SAUCE

These "same old chops" will take a new lease on life (and appetites) if you serve them with "Sauce Oseberg". That's in Norway where the best sardines come from, and if you think a sardine-and-relish paste doesn't belong on steak and on chops you'll find out different. Here, now:

Mash to a paste a can of smoked sardines. Add ¼ cup chili sauce or catsup, juice of ½ lemon, 1 tablespoon very finely minced parsley and 1 tablespoon butter. Season with salt, a sprinkle of red pepper or tabasco. Serve cold or better, heat very gently and serve bubbling hot in a small sauce cup on a sizzling platter.

FOUR SQUARE PUDDING

Square off; get a new angle on bread pudding; serve "Four Square Pudding" for one of those three square meal-endings!

6 slices stale bread
½ cup raisins
¼ cup all-bran
2 eggs, separated
2 tbsps. sugar
¼ teasp. nutmeg
2 cups milk
1 teasp. vanilla extract
4 tbsps. sugar

Remove crusts from bread; spread with butter, cut bread into squares and arrange in layers in greased baking dish. Sprinkle each layer with raisins and all-bran. Beat egg yolks; add sugar, nutmeg, milk and flavoring; mix thoroughly and pour over bread. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 35 minutes. Cover with meringue made from two beaten egg whites and four tablespoons sugar. Bake in slow oven (300 deg. F., about 20 minutes or until meringue is brown. 8 servings.

DRESSING FOR GREENS

Now's the time to try unusual greens—the dandy dandelion, the elusive dock, the pun-

gent mustard. The tender, youngest ones are good raw, the older ones cooked together. For salad or as special dressing for quickly-cooked greens you'll like this dressing to serve hot; Combine a fourth-cup salad oil, two tablespoons lemon juice, a half-teaspoon sugar. Heat them to boiling point, pour over greens and sprinkle with a tablespoon minced onion and a half-cup of Roquefort cheese. Mmm.

On Oregon Farms

Escaped Foxes Causing Damage

GOLD BEACH — Black foxes which have escaped from fur farms have been causing considerable damage early this spring in the north end of Curry county, reports County Agent R. M. Knox. Although raised in captivity the foxes knew their way around well enough so that 15 lambs were killed on one farm. Agents of the biological survey were called in to attempt to trap the animals. One fox was run down with dogs and killed by farmers, after which loss was stopped in that vicinity.

Weed Control Effective

MORO — A concentrated weed control program carried out on the Henry Howell ranch is apparently giving good results. After using liquid chemicals applied with pressure pumps for several years, Howell last fall filled boxes of his grain drills with dry sodium chlorate and spread the chemical on morning glory infested land. The results were apparently successful. Howell has been able to use chemically treated land again the third year after chemical application, with yields being nearly as good as on adjoining untreated land.

Curry Sheepmen Form Co-op Pool

GOLD BEACH — Curry county sheep men arranged to market close to a quarter of a million pounds of their wool under a cooperative pooling plan, reports County Agent R. M. Knox, who assisted in getting them together to work out a program. Care of the wool at shearing time to insure highest quality possible is being emphasized.

Sheep men who have been working with Oregon State college veterinarians in the control of a serious disease now being studied here, report material benefit from the use of the English serum as compared with other treatment or no treatment at all.

If You're Planning To Build

WHEN you are planning your house, no matter how inexpensive it may be, keep in mind how you will furnish it. The position of the windows in a bedroom often determines the location of the bed. This is only a detail in house planning, but it looms important when the structure is completed. Sizes of the various pieces of furniture should be remembered at all times. Large pieces of furniture should never be placed against a window. Another matter that should be considered is the stock sizes of rugs and carpets. It is aggravating to find that a room is a few inches too short to take a suitable stock-size floor covering.

CHOOSING the site. Before obtaining the drawings of a house, many things should be considered that will have a direct effect upon the design of the building. First, the site should be studied with reference to its surroundings and its probable future development. Its convenience to neighboring cities or towns should be considered, as well as means of public transit, bathrooms in the matters of light, power, gas, electricity, sewage, water supply, garbage disposal, etc. The owner should be reasonably sure that the property in the vicinity will develop so as to increase in value and beauty.

The parts of which a house consists may be considered under three different groups: living, sleeping and service groups.

The living group includes the living room, dining room, library, den, porches, and other parts of the house that are used for the comfort and enjoyment of the family and guests.

The sleeping group comprises bedrooms, sleeping porches, bath-rooms, closets, etc., that are generally placed in the upper floors, except in bungalows, where they are on the ground floor.

The service group consists of the kitchen, pantry, store-rooms, laundry, cellar, etc., all of which parts should be conveniently grouped as far as possible.
