Fever Potatoes in Klamath
KLAMATH FALLS—Slight decrease in potato acreage in this county is expected this year with estimates running from 3 per cent to 10 per cent under last year. A total of more than 8,000 cars were shipped this past season with final marketings early in May. A more balanced farming program with potatoes in rotation is being advocated by the County Agent C. A. Henderson.

bination zinc sulphate and boron solution in the control of little leaf on cherries and peaches has again proved its superiority over use of zinc sulphate alone, reports W. Wray Lawrence, county agent, after inspecting orchards in company with horticultural specialists from the state college. Control of little leaf has lasted for three years where the combination spray was used, while if boron was not added trees apparently needed to be treated every year or two. The use of a spreader is also

found advisable with the other material.

SPRAY ADVISED FOR MOTH CONTROL

Application of a lead arsenate spray at this time for the control of worms in apples and pears should be made, says county agent Cyrus. Adult codling moths are now laying eggs and these eggs will hatch in the course of seven or eight days.

The young fruit should receive its protective coat of spray before the eggs hatch.

Powdered lead arsenate used at the rate of three pounds to 100 gallons of water is a standard recommendation that has proven effective when thoroughly and properly applied. Calcium arsenate has been successfully used but has never proven superior to lead arsenate. From time to time various other materials are offered on the market but in western Oregon the arsenate, and preferably lead arsenate, is perhaps the more effective.

The home orchardist is always confronted with the problem of how many sprays to use in combatting disease and insect pests. If the fruit is to be marketed commercially it is necessary that a practically full spray program be carried out, which means two or three times and sulphur sprays in the spring followed by perhaps one combination lime-sulphur and lead arsenate, and these succeeded by perhaps three cover sprays. The home orchardist need not follow quite so complete a spray program. He can successfully combat the ordinary diseases and insect pests and produce a crop of good quantity for home use by using a lime sulphur dormant spray and a combination lime sulphur and lead arsenate spray at the time the bloom drops, and perhaps one cover spray.

In all of these spray preparations, whether in the home orchard or commercial orchard, thoroughness of application is essential. Not only the fruit should be covered but the foliage as well.

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
