Cook With A Yankee Accent

It's the "American way" in cooking too! The revival of things American—on the stage, in the movies, in books, fashions and home design—and the new appreciation of our national food heritage has hit our kitchens too, and food comes out with a Yankee Doodle accent!

Nowhere as in the United States has science so helped the cook—quick transportation to rush market goods, a multitude of ready to use good things in gleaming glass jars. Adapting the good things of other countries, keeping its own, American cookery is on its way up.

So it's three cheers for fried chicken, for ham and eggs, for hot biscuits, ice cream, succotash, corn on the cob, hamburgers, banana pie, steamed clams. And it's a tiger for some of the new ways clever American cooks have discovered for using them!

New England Bran Muffins

1/2 cup molasses
2 cups all-bran
1 1/2 cups milk
1 egg
1 cup flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda

Add all-bran to molasses and milk and allow to soak for 15 minutes. Beat egg and add to first mixture. Sift flour, salt and soda together and combine with all-bran mixture. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full and bake in moderately hot oven (400°F.) about 20 minutes. Yield: 1 doz. muffins.

Stuffed Eggs California

6 hard-cooked eggs
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. black pepper
1/4 tsp. dry mustard
1/4 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 1/2 tsp. grated onion
2 tsp. butter, melted
1 tsp. chili sauce
1/4 tsp. celery seed
1/4 cup mayonnaise
8 ripe olives, chopped
Cut eggs in half, lengthwise. Remove yolks and rub through

sieve. Add remaining ingredients except mayonnaise and olives. Add mayonnaise and beat until fluffy. Add olives. Refill egg whites, leaving surface roughened. 6 portions.

Banana Chocolate Cream Pie

1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate
2 cups milk
3/4 cup sugar
5 tbsps. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1 tsp. butter
3/4 tsp. vanilla extract
3 ripe bananas, sliced
1 baked 9-inch pie shell

Select fully ripe bananas (yellow peel flecked with brown) and use level measurements. Add chocolate to milk in top of double boiler. Heat over rapidly boiling water until chocolate is melted. Beat with rotary egg beater until blended. Mix together sugar, flour, salt and egg yolks. Stir slowly into chocolate mixture. Cook until well thickened, stirring constantly. Cook 10 minutes longer, stirring occasionally. Stir small amount of hot mixture into egg yolks; then pour back into remaining hot mixture while beating vigorously. Cook 1 minute longer. Remove from heat and add butter and vanilla. Cool. Place alternate layers of filling and bananas in pie shell. Top with meringue or sweetened whipped cream. Makes 1 pie.

Baked Beans, Picnic

2 cups pea beans
1/4 tsp. soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
2 oz. salt pork
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
1 small onion, peeled
Wash beans and soak over night in cold water. Next morning add soda and cook beans in same water, until skins begin to loosen. Place one-half the salt pork, sliced, in bottom of bean pot; add one-half the

beans and half the seasonings; bury onion in beans. Pour corn syrup over top, cover with salt pork. Add boiling water slowly until seeps through beans to top. Cover and bake in slow oven four hours or longer, until liquid is absorbed.

Seven Die Every Minute

With a dozen strokes of the chalk, the man at the blackboard roughed in what passed for a blank book laid out flat. After a few words from the old text—ALL HAVE SINNED, he set down on the open left page the word S-I-N and told the youngsters to call that their page.

Then he asked them to finish the verse—The wages of sin is—

What? All seemed to know for out came—Death. "The wages of sin is death." So under the word S-I-N already on, he tettered D-E-A-T-H. And, he asked, "How many sins in a life-time to earn death?" Ten thousand? Fifty thousand? You can't fool these kiddies. One sin anywhere between the cradle and the grave and you have earned death—eternal separation from God and His glory. They knew.

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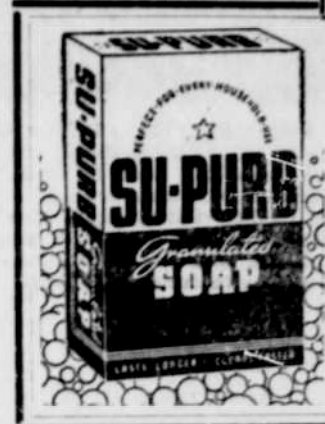

Housewives plan to change the ways of serving popular foods in keeping with seasons. So let's not forget our friends, The Macaroni Family, now that warm weather is here. Macaroni, spaghetti, egg noodles and the other members of this popular family that are such favorites in other seasons can be turned into dozens of excellent summer dishes.

This wheat food being bland will blend naturally and tastily with vegetables, with fruits and with meats to make a well-balanced main course dish that is easy to prepare, healthful and filled with the elements needed for body sustenance in every season. Any way this food is served, will prove a pleasing change in the menu. What more can one ask for?

As a change for the popular potato salad, why not serve a Macaroni Daisy Salad? Have you tried egg noodles as a cereal or as a dessert; or luscious spaghetti with butter? The folks will like them all.

Noodles with Fresh Fruit
1/2 lb. egg noodles
Fresh fruits in season
1 cup cream

Cook egg noodles in boiling, salted water, till tender and drain. Chop slightly with edge of a saucer. Mix with fruit cut in small pieces. Serve hot or cold, as a cereal, with cream.

Spaghetti al Burro

All housewives plan at least one hot dish daily. Here's one that is easy to prepare and a family favorite for luncheon.

1/2 lb. spaghetti
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup grated cheese
Salt and pepper

Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water till tender and turn onto a hot platter. Add seasoning and butter. Stir till all strands are well buttered and sprinkle grated cheese over all. Excellent with roasts, chicken or fish.

Macaroni Daisy Salad
Inasmuch as the average American family seems to have a growing mania for salads, try this one as a change from the popular potato salad.

1 lb. elbow macaroni
1 green sweet pepper
1 dill or sweet pickle
Salt and pepper
4 hard-boiled eggs
1 large ripe tomato
1 medium onion, chopped fine
1/2 cup French dressing or mayonnaise

Cook elbow macaroni in boiling, salted water till tender, then drain.
