The injured included David Hagerman, 13; Edward, 9 and Betty, 11; Joseph Stoller, 15 and John, 13; and two women whose names were not obtained, according to Ireland.

The proposed Sorrento district, which is roughly the same district approved in a previous election and voided by the county court, borders on Beaverton's south city limits.

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INCREASED ALLOTMENT IS GIVEN

An increased wheat allotment has been given Washington County under the 1940 Agricultural Conservation Program, according to information received from the State Office by Joan W. Kanna, Chairman of the Washington County Committee.

Total county allotment for all wheat farms in Washington County under the 1940 Program consists of 13,164 acres, as compared with 12,424 acres total county wheat allotment in 1939. This represents an acreage allotment increase of approximately 6 per cent for 1940. A maximum of three per cent of this total figure is available for establishing wheat allotments in 1940 on those farms where no wheat has been grown in 1937, 1938 and 1939.

Within a short time individual wheat allotments will be sent to the Washington County wheat farmers who will participate in the 1940 Agricultural Conservation Program. Compliance with this or any other phase of the program is still voluntary.

"This increased wheat allotment for the county does not mean that individual wheat allotments will be raised on all wheat farms, due to the fact that in some cases the 1939 wheat allotment was out of proportion with total crop acreage for the respective farm, type of farming and other factors. On those farms where wheat allotments were out of line with the factors mentioned above the 1940 wheat allotments may be decreased to fit the respective situation for the farm on which such an allotment exists," announced chairman Kanna.
