The SNAPSHOT GUILD

Vacation Diary—In Pictures



Make your vacation "picture-diary" complete. Take general views and scenes—but get "fun" pictures and close-ups, too. And snap interesting details of places you visit.

EACH of us, at some time or other, has kept a diary. Have you thought of using your camera for this purpose? It's a good idea at any time, but now, at vacation time, it has especial point.

Look back over your vacations for the past few years. How good a picture story of each vacation did you get? Does your picture album show all the things you did—all the interesting spots you visited—the fun your group had? Or is the record rather spotty, and the pictures too much alike?

Chances are, you missed many opportunities. Perhaps you ran short of film—that's a common mistake of vacationers. But, more likely, you shot your vacation pictures without a definite plan. You didn't outline a story for your vacation pictures to tell.

For this year's vacation, here's a better method. As you map out your vacation plans, jot down picture possibilities in a notebook—one small enough to keep with you. Note down the things you want to remember—packing, departure, points of interest en route to your destination, things you will do each day after you arrive.

If you're taking a motor tour, also note down in advance the interesting or different features of the country through which you will pass

—mountains, prairies, big trees, palms or moss-hung oaks, gorges and canyons, or whatever you expect to see. Then resolve to get good pictures of these revealing features. If, perchance, you're taking a cruise to another land, make similar notes of things you'll want to picture—the people, national dress, any public fiestas or celebrations, interesting types of architecture, the "different" aspects of the country you'll see.

If you're visiting places of historical interest, or special current interest—such as a World Fair—study the literature available, and note down the buildings you'll want to shoot, and other details you'd like to keep in pictures.

And, on vacation, keep this notebook and your camera busy. Concentrate on getting pictures that really tell the story of what you saw and did. Don't take general views exclusively—single out details that especially interest you, and get close-ups of them. Shoot as many pictures as are necessary to make your vacation record a true "picture diary."

That's the real way to picture a vacation. Try it—and you'll build up an album to show your friends that is genuinely worth while; an album to treasure for years.

Steen Says AAA Keeps Growers Solvent

Pacific northwest wheat growers could not stay in business and sell wheat on the basis of present prices, Will Steen of Milton, chairman of the Oregon AAA committee, told a national radio audience recently. Farm prices last year for wheat would have averaged around 20¢ a bushel on the basis of the export market, Steen pointed out.

Wheat growers taking part in the farm program in 1940 are going to be sure of about 86¢ a bushel, said the Oregon chairman. The wheat loans will average around 58¢ on the farm. Parity payments are 11¢ and conservation payments 17¢.

"This isn't parity income for wheat but it is better than had last year," Steen stated. "Those outside the program won't have as good an income from wheat as those in the program, although they will benefit from the efforts of others."

He added that Oregon farmers to date have seeded more than 100,000 acres of wheat land to create wheat grass in doing their part toward reducing the large surplus wheat acreage.

Farm Homes In Oregon Cost \$48,680.00

Special to the Beaverton Review WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27—The Farm Security administration which is building "farmstead" homes, announces that 29 such homes in Oregon cost a total of \$48,680. The maximum cost was \$1779, the minimum—\$426. In Washington state 44 homes have been built for \$81,124, the most expensive being \$2199 and the cheapest \$1504.

Circular Gives Many Gladioli Pointers

Gladioli are among the most satisfactory and universal flower grown in Oregon, whether for home use, exhibit purposes, or on a commercial basis, says Dr. W. P. Duruz, professor of pomology and horticulture at Oregon State college, in a recent extension circular dealing with gladioli culture.

Those interested in this flower will find in extension circular 329 a brief history of the plant, its botany, a discussion of varieties, and the latest suggestions for growing gladioli successfully.

Of importance during the warm summer, says Dr. Duruz, is a constant supply of moisture for these flowers. Occasional heavy irrigation is beneficial in promoting the best growth of the plants and several applications of fertilizer such as bone meal phosphate, or a complete chemical fertilizer, or liquid or other manure, will be beneficial.
