CROSS AT CROSSINGS

How to reduce the mounting toll of automobile accidents and fatalities is further considered in a review of the National Safety Council's pertinent captioned: "What's New in Traffic Safety?" Gathering many statistics the conclusion reached is:

"The crying need of adults is to learn how to cross streets."

There were 30,000 auto traffic fatalities last year, of whom 11,000 were pedestrians.

It has been emphasized many times it is in the interests of life to "cross crossings carefully." But in too many cases the pedestrian doesn't use the crossings at designated places where there are traffic lights affording a measure of safety.

SAFETY FIRST

Speed as a highway killer still remains traffic enemy No. 1 according to the annual report of the New York State Motor Vehicle Commission. Darkness, however, runs a close second and is ranked as traffic enemy No. 2 by Motor Vehicle Commissioner Mealey.

The analysis of traffic accidents in New York state during the year, and as summarized in the report, points to the menace of insufficient illumination for night driving. The report states that 1,000 cars operating at night will be involved in twice as many accidents as the same number operating in the daylight. Reports on some 1,400 night accidents in New York state last year showed that 908 were caused by factors which may have involved headlights in one manner or another. It was determined that about 305 accidents were probably due to insufficient headlight illumination outside of lighted areas. Glare was the basic cause of 154 accidents in and outside of lighter areas.

The conclusion drawn by Commissioner Mealey is that there are twice as many accidents by night and that these are usually of a particularly disastrous character and are caused as much by insufficient illumination as by glare. The recommendation is made that the upper, or driving beam distribution should be increased somewhat in order to provide better headlight illumination on those highways where it is impracticable to install adequate highway safety lights.

The United States Junior Chamber of Commerce is promoting a most valuable project in its campaign to secure better lighting for America's fatal streets. This organization gives money prizes to local chambers which organize and conduct the most constructive "Safety With Light" programs toward promoting night traffic safety in their communities.

The slogan "Slow Down at Sun Down" is a good one to put into actual use. Good street lighting at dangerous curves, intersections and on narrow streets will aid materially to eliminate some of the danger of after sun-down driving. An organization like the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce can do a valuable work in promoting a program of this nature.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

ACTION SHOOTING



A subject such as this will make a good "action sequence"—a series of pictures showing the complete toss, step by step. Pose your subject in "slow motion," and it's easy.

ACTION shooting is one of the most interesting phases of amateur photography—and good action pictures can be obtained with any camera, if you know how.

To "stop" true fast action, and get sharp pictures, you need a fast shutter—one that can be adjusted to 1/400 or 1/500 second. Such a camera is a wise investment if you intend to do much shooting of unposed action subjects—you simply set the shutter for top speed, adjust the lens opening for correct exposure at that speed, and fire away.

With slower cameras, however, you can still get good action pictures if you pose your subject in slow motion. Let him go through the natural motions of the sport—golf, tennis, or whatever you choose—but have him move as slowly as possible. Then shoot when the action looks most effective.

This trick will work for box cameras, as well as the many excellent folding cameras whose shutters adjust as high as 1/100 second. And it is marvelously effective if well done, the pictures retaining a genuine appearance of fast action.

Interesting action "sequences" can be made in the manner just described. For example, a series of a young woman tossing a beach ball. Two or three shots of the swing each at a different point; a fourth with the ball barely supported by her finger tips; a fifth with her arms fully extended and the ball out of the picture. Such a sequence is easily obtained if the subject goes through the action very slowly several times—and it is surprisingly effective when the pictures are mounted in proper order in your album.

In all action shooting, take care not to become excited, or you may press the shutter release too jerkily—moving the camera and blurring the shot. When taking a posed-action shot, of a subject that will stay in one place, it's often a good idea to put the camera on a tripod or some other firm support.

Try your hand at action shots—including a few sequences such as that outlined above. It's interesting photography—and good, lively shots of this type add spice to your album.

Government Farm Sales Show Increase

Sales of Oregon farm land by the Federal Land Bank of Spokane in the first six months of 1939 showed a 14½ percent gain over the same period last year, E. M. Ehrhardt, president, announced this week.

Reasons for the gain are found in the greater interest being shown in real estate by tenants, adjacent farm owners and investors, and in the vigorous effort being made by the bank to return its properties to private ownership, he said.

From January through June sales of farms in Oregon by the land bank amounted to \$313,372. In the entire 12th Farm Credit district—Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana—sales during the period totaled slightly more than \$1,500,000, a substantial gain over last year.

Sales also are being made with more cash down this year than last, Ehrhardt reported, an indication of the confidence buyers are showing in the future of Oregon agriculture.

There are several reasons for the healthy condition of the farm real estate market. It was pointed out. "Land is realistically priced on the basis of normal yields and average prices," Ehrhardt explained. "Values have not been touched by any speculative fever, yet commodity prices are bound to rise in the future, and when they do, land prices will rise with them."

Alfalfa Yield Increased By Use of Boron

Boron applied in the late winter, or early spring to alfalfa plantings in Washington county resulted in an increased yield

of alfalfa hay in the second cutting, and in some instances, an improvement in the yield and quality was even apparent in the first cutting. Perhaps the effect of this material on the first crop was brought about by the dry season and similar results could not be expected under normal Williamette valley spring conditions.

Results such as are now apparent in the second cuttings can, however, be expected practically every year on both the second and third crops, where the latter is possible, say County Agent Cyrus. The boron was applied in the form of borax at a rate varying from 20 to 30 pounds per acre. In some instances, with phosphate. Either method is satisfactory, the prime essential being that the two materials are thoroughly mixed. It is necessary that the boron be mixed with some kind of carrier as it is virtually impossible to evenly spread as small a quantity as 20 or 30 pounds per acre.

Where irrigation is not practical, or where rains cannot be expected to dissolve the borax, it can be applied in solution if some type of sprinkler is available. This method is, of course, impractical on any considerable scale, but any grower who is desirous of determining the effectiveness of boron could well get a small quantity and apply it to a few square rods by the last described method and observe the results. It is rather quick acting material and if applied now, its effect would be apparent this summer, and would, according to past experience, continue to show its effectiveness through the next season.

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
