LIBRARY NOTES

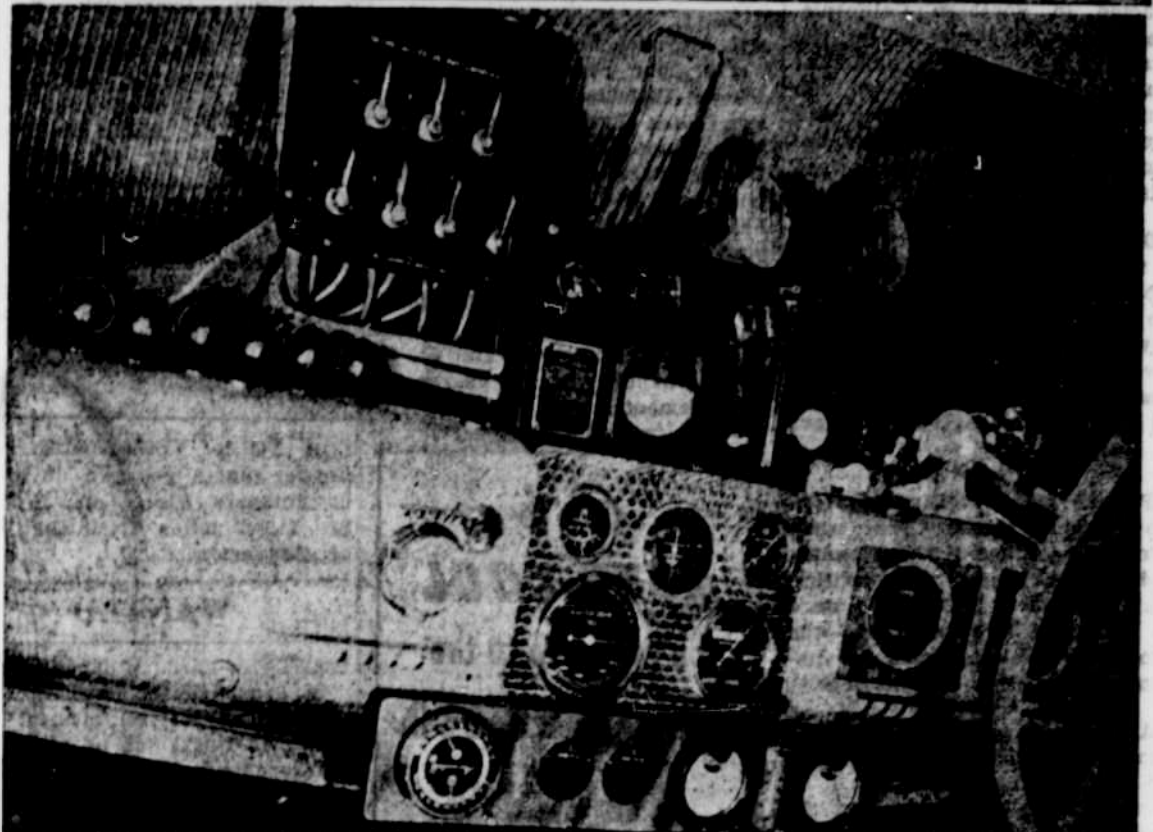
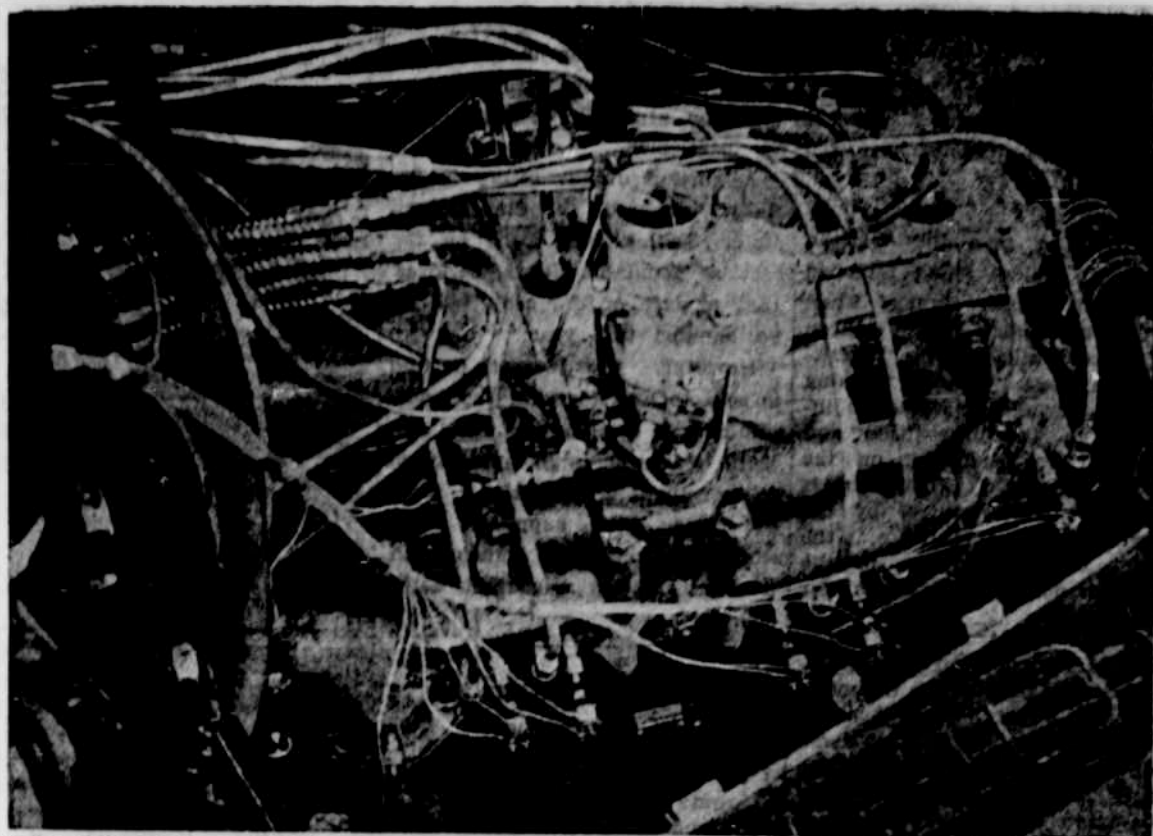

PRACTICAL METHODS APPLIED TO SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH

There is no substitute for experience. Nowhere is this more true than in the operation and maintenance of an automobile.

The Hancock Refinery, after a three year period of "cut and try" has worked out a practical system of instruments for use in testing all grades of fuels and lubricants under actual service conditions. Reuben G. Lovell, development engineer of the Hancock organization, is now making a tour of the northwest with his traveling laboratory and is showing that which is probably the world's most elaborate motor vehicle instrument board and related auxiliaries.

Low and high range pyrometers and selector switches pick up readings from 17 thermo-electric couples placed at strategic spots in the engine. Some of these readings are temperatures of air and gasoline entering the carburetor and also the heat of the air-gasoline vapor as it leaves the carburetor on its way to the cylinder—can be noted at the time.

Exhaust gases can be conducted from each exhaust valve through a system of tubing to an ingenious device which indicates the relative proportions of gasoline

and air in the fuel charge to each cylinder. A seemingly remarkable condition has been disclosed by these latter instruments. With the aid to the carburetor at 120 degrees and the gasoline at 90 degrees, the temperature of the mixture of the two, taken directly at the throat of the intake manifold, is found to be much lower than either the air or the gasoline—sometimes at 70 degrees under above conditions.

Studies of these results indicated clearly the extra value of a gasoline from which had been removed the "wild" fractions which had been such a prolific source of trouble from "vapor lock." The company has installed at its Long Beach refinery a complete unit for the stabilization of all fractions used in compounding their Five Point and Hancock Ethyl gasolines. Lovell states that this stabilized gasoline has shown complete freedom from vapor lock in his "loping laboratory" and a definite increase in mileage.

Facilities are provided on the instrument panel for direct temperature readings of the oil in the crankcase and of the bearings. A specially designed viscom-

eter tube-pressure regulator combination is connected directly into the line carrying the oil to the bearings. The dial of this device is located on the panel and shows the viscosity of the oil in the standard units—Saybolt Seconds Universal—regardless of speed of the engine or pressure of the oil.

The new high speed lubricating oil developed by Hancock was a result of the research done with this car. Lovell reports that he found that certain blends of light lubricating oil stocks when compounded with proper percentages of carefully oxidized petroleum and used in the car made it impossible to attain high oil or bearing temperatures.

The traveling laboratory is attracting unusual attention throughout the state, where it is being shown through the local distributors of Hancock gasoline.
