It works something like this: A man who has been making \$100 a month since the old age insurance was established in 1937, paying 1 percent of his salary, and becomes 65 years old on December 31, 1939, will be entitled to receive \$75 monthly while he lives, and his wife, when she reaches 65, will receive a supplementary payment of \$12.37, making a total pay-

ment of \$38.62. If the husband dies after 1940, the widow will receive monthly \$19.31 for life.

Another change is that a man can continue working after 65 and build up his insurance credits as long as he is in employment covered by the program.

French motion picture producers are smuggling American farmers by smuggling films into the U. S. in diplomatic pouches (untouchable) in order to evade payment of customs duties. Part of customs duties are used to assist agriculture and every dollar the French smugglers avoid paying is a detriment to farmers. State department diplomats regard it as a serious faux pas inasmuch as France does not wish to pay a sou on its world war debt.

Wheat farmers of Washington and Oregon who wish to insure their 1940 winter wheat crop must make application and present premium payments before October 30, which is the deadline for those states. In northern Idaho it is October 30, but in southern Idaho, September 30. Growers are required to complete applications before the crop is seeded. No deadlines have been set for acceptance of applications in 1940 spring wheat.

Many Attractions At State Fair

The brilliant San Francisco Sheriff's Mounted Posse will be the super attraction at the Oregon State fair in Salem September 4-10 fair officials announce. The riding aggregation will appear at the nightly horse show. The posse includes 25 excel-

lent riders and high-stepping mounts, and with their classy uniforms and silver mounted equipment, the unit presents an outstanding spectacle.

Captained by Wilson Meyer, the posse is composed of San Francisco business and professional men who love the sport of horsemanship and who all became duly sworn deputy sheriffs of San Francisco city and county upon election to the posse.

Among the members is Peter A. Byrne, the noted novelist.

The entire colorful drill the posse executes is done at an easy gallop, except in two places where it cuts loose with speed.

The posse drew 130,000 people at a 10-night showing on Treasure Island. The appearance at the state fair night horse show will be its only one outside of California, though it has some engagements in that state until early December.

Captain Meyer has written the state fair director that while in Oregon for the week's engagement the posse members hope to find time during the day to see many of the state's places of historic and scenic interest.

Some of the San Franciscoans will enter their horses in two special classes that have been arranged for them alone in the night horse show competitive events. These classes include stake races and light weight stock horses.

The stadium's Silver Bowl, so named because it has been entirely re-decorated both in the arena and seats, will form an attractive background for the whole schedule of horse show events, and especially for the Mounted Posse.

The first Tennessee walking horses ever seen at a Northwest fair will be shown at the 78th Oregon state fair, which opens Labor day in Salem. The walking horses, brought to Oregon this spring from the heart of the Tennessee district which has made them famous, will come from the stables of Mrs. P. Lorillard Ronalds of Sisters. Horses to be shown at the fair, September 4-10, all hold Tennessee championships.

The quints are coming to the Oregon state fair and their names are Youne, Emile, An-

nette, Marie and Cecile. But that's as far as resemblance to the famous Dionne girls, unless one wants to consider that they are girls. The quints that will be shown at the state fair, which opens in Salem Labor day and closes September 19, are Nubian doe kids, born to Hlahee Zita, a registered goat owned by Mrs. Margaretha Steiger of Portland. So far as is known, these are the only goat doe quintuplets ever born in America.

First out-of-state swine entries made for the 78th Oregon state fair are from the Lillard Stock Farm, Arlington, Texas. Mr. Lillard will exhibit 74 swine, including six breeds. More out-of-state stock than ever before is expected at the Oregon fair this year, as many eastern breeders are making the coast fair circuits enroute to or from the Treasure Island shows.

At least six six-horse exhibition teams will vie at the Oregon state fair, September 4 to 10 for the \$500 stake offered in this class at the night horse show, fair officials report. These big teams will also compete for the D. F. Burge perpetual trophy, an award earned three years and therefore permanently by the late D. F. Burge of Albany, whose six-horse hitch won the acclaim of state fair horse show patrons for a generation. Mr. Burge died last fall, and his widow has presented the trophy won by him as a perpetual award in this class.
