Final Date Set For Wheat Insurance

The final date for acceptance of applications from Oregon wheat growers for crop insurance on their 1940 winter wheat crop is October 30, according to Will Steen of Milton, chairman of the state AAA committee.

Mark Weatherford, Gilliam county wheat grower, was the first man to take insurance on his winter wheat crop for next year. Most of the applicants last year and this have taken 75 per cent coverage.

Out of 708 policies in effect in Oregon this past season, indemnity payments totaling 44,690 bushels on 52 policies have been made to date, and others are pending. Principal causes of losses were late frosts, dry weather and the July hail storm in Morrow county.

"Winter wheat growers who want to insure their crops have two factors to keep in mind," he said. "First, they must apply for the insurance and pay the premium before their crop is planted this fall. Second applications cannot be accepted even if the crop hasn't been planted, after the general cut-off date of October 30."

The state chairman reminded wheat growers that all farmers who intend to plant wheat to harvest in 1940 are eligible for "all-risk" crop insurance now being offered to growers by the Federal Crop Insurance corporation. Either the operator or the landlord, or both, may insure their interest in the crop.

Under the crop insurance program, growers may insure their interest in either 50 or 75 per cent of the average yield of their farms. Where more than one person has an interest in the crop, each may insure his own interest independently of action of the others. Separate contracts are made to each individual, without affecting the interest of other parties. Application is made to the county AAA committee.

Council Considers New WPA Gravel Project

A meeting of the council was called Tuesday night to discuss several matters of interest to the welfare of the town.

Most important action of the council was the authorizing of an application for a new WPA project to utilize gravel from the Southern Pacific right of way for street construction.

This material would be available from the locations at which the Southern Pacific company has recently removed tracks.

4-H Special Awards For County Fair

Special awards to be given by various breeders and private concerns as prizes for 4-H boys and girls in the Washington County fair are arousing considerable interest among the agricultural club members, according to Palmer Torvend, assistant county agent.

Two purebred hogs will be presented to the highest scoring boy or girl, on the basis of the quality of the animal exhibited, and the showmanship, herdmanship, record book, and general 4-H record of the exhibitor. A purebred Chester White gilt will be awarded by Adrian Hornbecker of Hillsboro to the winning Chester White exhibitor and a purebred Duroc-Jersey will be awarded by Clayton Nyberg of Tualatin to the winning Duroc-Jersey exhibitor. Both of these breeders are former club members and Mr. Nyberg is a local 4-H club leader. Last year's awards were won by Arthur Jacques of Tualatin and Margaret Schwanke of Schefflin, respectively.

The Washington County Jersey Cattle club is listed to award a heifer calf on the same basis of scoring as that for the swine. Mrs. C. E. Robertson & Son of Forest Grove will award a Jersey calf to the club member who is selected as being the winning Jersey showman. The Guernsey Cattle club has in the past two years awarded a calf also and may possibly do so this year but to date have not selected a person to make the award. Last year a Jersey calf was awarded by L. T. Sills of Cornelius and won by Wilbur Moore of Scholls while the Guernsey calf was awarded by Julius Christensen & Sons and won by Loren Trachsel of Redville.

The Carnation Milk company offers a perpetual trophy known as the "Calf Manna Trophy" to the dairy club making the highest score at the Washington County fair on the following basis: percentage of club members exhibiting, judging contest scores, placing of exhibits, demonstration team placements, showmanship, herdmanship, and fitting. Last year this award was won by the Reedville Dairy club.

The Sperry Flour company will award a trophy to the boy or girl adjudged grand champion showman of the 1939 Washington County fair. Last year this award was won by Loren Trachsel.

Douglas fir, pipe and other lumber is needed in Spain for reconstruction but this business

must wait until the Spanish government is prepared to consent to importation. On ybasic raw material is permitted for the present and all manufactured articles are prohibited. Inquiry by the bureau of foreign commerce discloses that when Spain allows lumber to be imported it will draw the line at plywood products, such as doors. For years Spain held 13th position as a market for American lumber. The market is expected to open next winter; the far east market when hostilities quiet down. Each country will require billions of feet of lumber from the United States, most originating in the Pacific Northwest. A delegation of Japanese business men recently visited the Northwest and made tentative plans to purchase a huge amount of Pacific coast products.
