Mrs. Essex Marsh was elected chairman to represent the high school for the PTA at Tuesday evening's meeting.

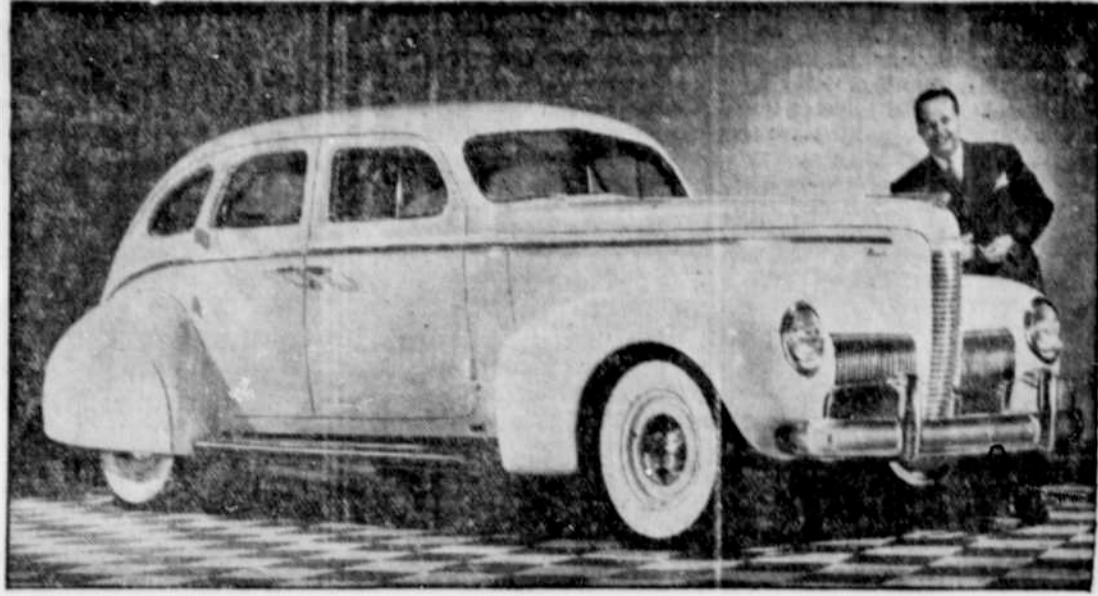

Walker, who is shown with one of the new Nash models (the Nash Ambassador Eight two-door sedan) which he designed in collaboration with Nash engineers, says that the principles of aero-dynamic streamlining just beginning to be used by leading manufacturers today will be the most important element in automotive body design in the coming decade. Exemplified in the new Nashes, this design has brought not only a new operating efficiency to motor vehicles by reducing wind resistance and road noises to a minimum, but has given them a breath-taking new beauty. Distinguished for their eye appeal, the new 1940 Nashes also are said to offer what is described as an "Arrow-Flight" ride. The perfected riding qualities of the car are attributed to an advanced type of springing which combines knee action of long synchronous leaf springs and giant shock absorbers in the rear, and soft, individual coil springs in front.
