This year's Pacific International offers dairy cattle breeders an opportunity to see some of the outstanding dairy cattle of the nation which will be exhibited there. Of interest to Jersey breeders will be the foremost Highflyer, many times national grand champion Jersey bull.

Mickle of the state department of agriculture, Salem; Henry Hartman, horticulturist, Oregon Experiment station, Corvallis; J. G. Baecher, Portland florist who has just returned from a trip to Europe; and Frank McKennon, chief SDA division of plant industry, Salem.

Foeshman Class At OSC Same Size

OSC, Corvallis—Early registration figures at this institution indicate a freshman class of about the same size as last year—just over 1500—and total fall enrollment slightly in excess of last year's 4406, says E. B. Lemmon, registrar.

First day of the fall term, when only freshmen and other new students sign up, ended with 1401 having completed registration. This is an increase of 8.5 percent over last year on the comparable date. An increase in number of students transferring from other institutions accounts for most of this early gain in new students. Although classes started Monday, October 2, late registration will continue several days.

Endeavor Convention At Forest Grove

The Washington County Christian Endeavor Union convention which is to be held in the Forest Grove Christian church, October 21 and 22, is going to be one of the biggest C. E. conventions ever held in this country.

State C. E. union officers and notable speakers are listed on the program. Besides conferences on C. E. work there will be recreation and the annual Saturday evening banquet.

Miss Willa Nolan of Forest Grove is the county booster and she reports that many registrations have already been received. Registration fee is only ten cents and the entertainment will be on the Harvard plan. The price of the banquet will be forty cents and will be prepared by the ladies of the Christian church.

Season Open On Antelope Weekend

The attention of big game hunters this coming weekend will be directed toward bagging an antelope with the opening of the special three day season in certain sections of Lake, Malheur and Harney counties on Friday, October 6. While the securing of a trophy is the aim of most of the hunters, last year's hunt demonstrated that the meat of an antelope was palatable in spite of the impression held by many that it was not.

The number of permits is limited to 150 each for Malheur and Harney counties and 300 for Lake county. Permits are still available for all three counties although as the season approaches, the demand is increasing. The permits are being issued by the office of the game commission in Portland in the order that applications are received. Anyone desiring a permit should forward the fee of five dollars together with information as to he number and kind of his hunting license.

Hunters will be required to check in and out of the area, regardless of whether or not a kill is made, at any one of the checking stations to be located as follows: Jordan valley, Burns, McDermitt, Denio, Lakeview and the junction of highway No. 395 with road to Plush, this junction being located just north of Valley falls. Each hunter must provide himself with adequate facilities for transporting and taking care of his meat.

Guns smaller than 30 caliber cannot be used except when using cartridges with bullets of not less than 1400 foot pound energy at 100 yards distance or weighing not less than 150 grains. It is unlawful for a person to shoot at antelope from highways, horse back, automobiles or within fifty yards of his own vehicle.

A school of instruction will be conducted by Mrs. C. W. Walls, president of the State Congress of Parent-Teachers, in the morning, followed by a program in the afternoon.

\$3,830,000 Orders Placed By S. P. Company

Orders for approximately 60,000 gross tons of steel rail, to take care of 1940 requirements, have been placed by the Southern Pacific company at a total cost of about \$2,655,000, according to an announcement by A. D. McDonald, president of the railroad.

The rail orders, McDonald said, are being divided between Columbia Steel company, Bethlehem Steel company and Colorado Fuel & Iron Corporation.

In addition, Southern Pacific is buying approximately 19,300 tons of rail fastenings for use on its Pacific lines, at a cost of about \$1,175,000, it was stated. Orders for the fastenings are being placed with the following firms: Columbia Steel company, Bethlehem Steel company, Colorado Fuel & Iron corporation, Rail Joint company, P & M company, National Lock Washer company, and Ramapo Ajax Division of American Brake Shoe & Foundry company.
