Feeding Growing Children

Millions of children are now at school. Their active minds and busy bodies present feeding problems that are real worries to parents—even to skilled dietitians. Statistics show that many children of school age are undernourished—not only city children but country children also. Mothers who prepare meals for children at home and supervisors of school cafeterias and lunch rooms, too, should see to it that wholesome foods are featured regularly.

The growing bodies of children require fuel or energy foods. This is especially true in the Fall and Winter months. Why not learn to prepare nutritious dishes of one of the energy trio of wheat foods—macaroni, spaghetti or egg noodles, serving them with milk, fruits or savory meats?

Macaroni products are rich in protein and easily prepared in many tasty combinations. Here are three economical, easy-to-prepare recipes for meals that vigorous growing children and grown-ups, too, will relish and on which they will thrive:

Macaroni au Gratin
For the hurried noon-time lunch or the more leisurely evening meal, here's a "first aid to appetites." You'll be delighted to note with what gusto the folk will take to this dish. Serve it often.

1/2 lb. macaroni
1/2 cup butter
1/2 lb. cheese
2 cups milk
1 cup tomatoes
Little salt, and flour
Cook macaroni till tender, drain. Make a cream sauce of melted butter, flour, salt and milk. Add cheese and stir until melted. Add cooked macaroni to cream sauce. Place in baking dish in alternate layers with tomatoes, having macaroni on top when through. Brown well. Serve hot.

Editor "Beaverton Review": Men like Col. Chas. Lindberg make the country worth living in. One would hate to live in the country without them. When he says "yes" he means yes and not "no," as seems to me the case of so many of our hoodluming politicians. When he speaks for peace or neutrality, you can count on him; but when some of our demagogues bawl and bluster about peace and neutrality you can take them with a grain of salt.

Lindberg's recent radio address was really more thrilling than his great flight across the ocean because it involved much more. To reject the wisdom of his counsel would be fatal. It is almost incredible that Senator Pittman should refuse that address a place in the pages of the Congressional Record! Such bigotry is very poor Americanism.

When Lindberg disclosed to us that the present war in Europe was not in defense of democracy or civilization, but a war over the balance of power, he told us a most timely truth. "The world at present," said Bertrand Russell, "is full of angry self-centered groups, each incapable of viewing human life as a whole each willing to destroy civiliza-

Egg Noodles—Chicken Soup
Fall and Winter is the "Soup Season." Here's a soup and meat combination that youngsters will relish and oldsters will welcome.

1/2 lb. egg noodles
1/2 cup milk
1 stewing chicken
Salt and pepper
Cut chicken into desired portions. Place in cold water and bring slowly to a boil, skimming from stock. Boil till meat is tender. Remove chicken from pot; drain. Add broth or stock to remove pieces of bone. Return boiled chicken to pot, add egg noodles and cook till tender. Add milk for richness. Season to taste.

For a change, add egg noodles to tomato soup or consommé.

Spaghetti Bird Nests
Here's a strong competitor for culinary honors—"Spaghetti Bird Nests," an eye-appealing and finger-appealing wheat and meat combination. It has the appetite appeal and nutritive goodness that makes young and old eat and eat.

1/2 lb. spaghetti
1/2 cup butter
1 doz. stuffed olives
8 strips bacon, wide and lean
Salt and pepper
Boil egg noodles in salted boiling water until tender; drain. Boil spaghetti in salted water until all strands are well cooked. Keep warm.

Form spaghetti into small mounds, binding with butter. Hold in place with toothpicks. Cut olives in halves and arrange in clover fashion in center of spaghetti mounds.

Bake or broil until bacon is done. Serve with surplus buttered spaghetti. Season to taste.

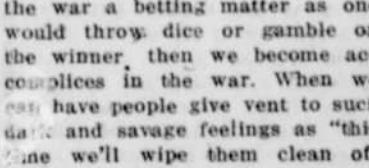

tion rather than yield." When the words "democracy" "civilization" etc., are used by certain powers care must be taken that we are not taken in as sheep for the slaughter. These beautiful and specious guises are set as bait to catch poor suckers, as we learned in the last world war. If the real motives were displayed in the open without their attractive cosmetics, the average man wouldn't get mad enough to fight, and that, of course, would never do. So the devil has made himself look like an angel to gain a following—that is, evil must be made to look like good and in the case of war, you do it by saying it is for "democracy," etc.

Whether or not we'll stay out of war depends on whether or not we're able and fit. Peace is one thing but to be worthy of peace is quite another. When we have people who would actually wall and gnash their teeth if peace were declared in Europe, because of their bestial desire for brutality and combat, then we're not worthy of peace. When we have people who actually make the war a betting matter as one would throw dice or gamble on the winner, then we become accomplices in the war. When we can have people give vent to such dark and savage feelings as "this time we'll wipe them clean off the map," etc., then we're not enhancing the civilizing forces of life. And when our own chief executive ignores all overtures to mediate on behalf of peace in Europe, one wonders whether we are sincere about peace and whether we really don't want war after all! At least, certain elements and interests apparently like to see a protracted war. These are the forces which make for destruction and should be resisted with all our might. We'll save civilization by behaving civilized and not as savages.

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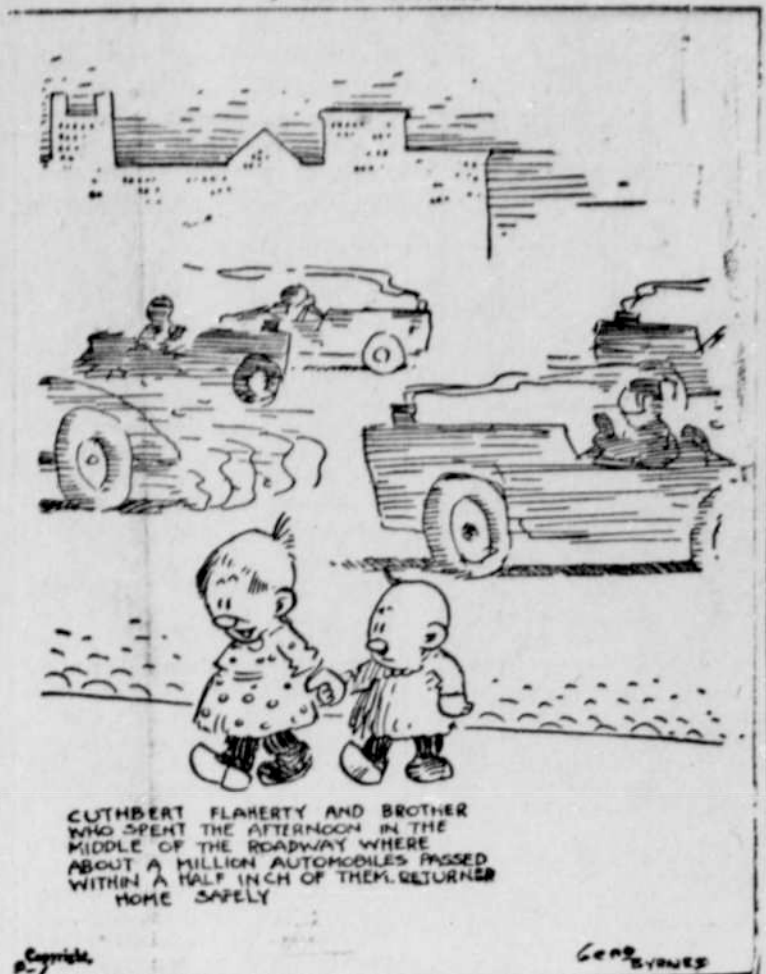
