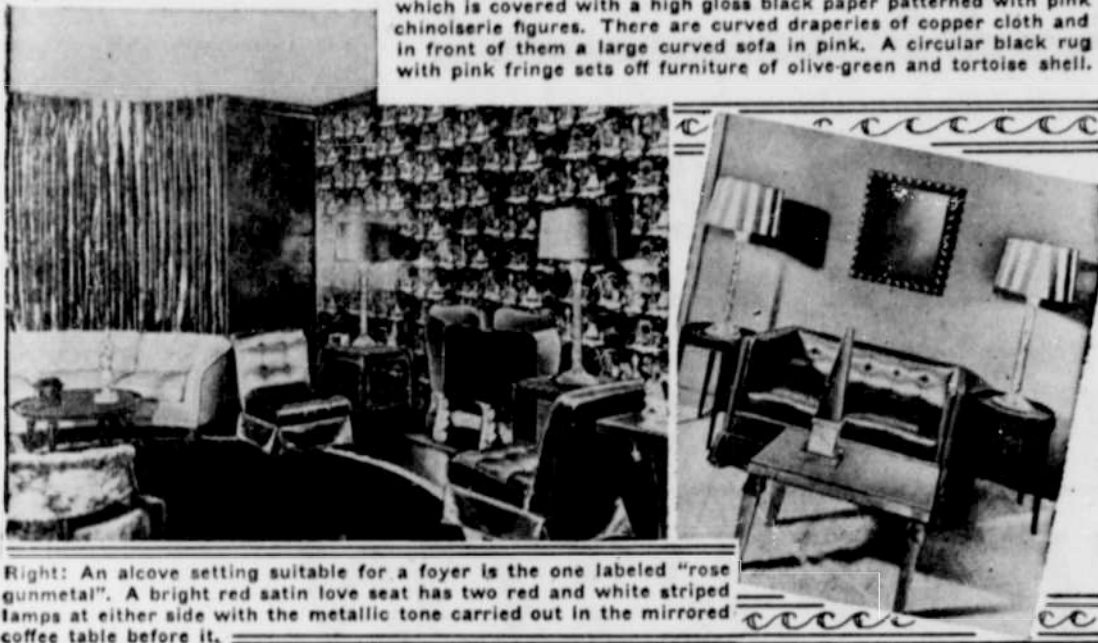
Three rooms and three alcove settings are exhibited, arranged on the new theme. The furniture floor of the Fifth Avenue emporium. Each grouping is built around a tone and special highlights of a different metal.

The store's decorators don't suggest that one goes immediately about doing a room in a metallic tone, especially a living room or any other part of a house where informal lounging is the way of things. They do believe, however, that homemakers can bring something into their homes of the sparkle and radiance of their new formal gowns. For example, this new sophisticated theme has a very definite place in a room where entertaining in rather formal ways is the "everyday habit". In a dining room, possibly, or in a drawing room, the metallic tones give smart distinction to the decoration.

By launching metallic tones for modern décor, Lord & Taylor show quite successfully how metals can become the nuclei for "at home" sophistication.

Panel Award For 1940 Won By Nash



Artful styling and careful attention to detail have made the new 1940 cars the most beautiful—inside and out—that the automobile industry has yet produced, according to leading style authorities. Characteristic of the brilliant work being done in the automotive field by engineers and designers is this smart, clean-cut instrument panel of the new 1940 Nash, which has just received the annual Modern Plas-

tics Award as the most distinctive panel of the year. Selected by a committee of America's outstanding stylists, the prize panel is a jeweler's piece of rich plastic and sparkling chromium, which provides a striking focal point for the beauty of the interior as a whole. A segment of the plastic, Tenite, gives a fourth dimensional effect to the panel and at the same time permits the placing of the instru-

ments for maximum visibility. An unusual lettering effect is accomplished by molding the characters into the translucent plastic and spraying the indentures from the inside in colors. The steering wheel, which was also cited in the award, is in rich oyster-white Tenite, and is lightly ribbed to provide a firm, comfortable grip. The design of the wheel permits a full view of the instruments at all times.
