Victoria and Vancouver Island, British Columbia, Where Winter Means Golf, Tennis, Fishing, Swimming



WINTER is the time for golf, tennis, fishing and swimming if you are on Vancouver Island. For thanks to the Japan current, which moderates the chill, the vacationist can be sure of all summer sports at Victoria, winter playground of the northern Pacific coast.

Victoria's winter season usually opens with a jolly, old-fashioned English Christmas celebration at the Empress Hotel, where costumed waltzes, wassail bowls, the boar's head, plum pudding and even holly growing outdoors reminds the holiday-maker of medieval England.

Just to prove that "golf all winter" is a reality, Victoria stages annually a Winter Golf Tournament.

played this year on the Royal Colwood course, March 2 to 9, for the Sir Edward Beatty trophy and the Victoria Chamber of Commerce Cup, trophies which in the past have mostly been won by Americans.

Vancouver Island provides splendid fishing, both deepsea and fresh water, during the winter. Salmon and grilse abound, and can be taken freely on flies and by trolling. Only recently Mrs. Anna Roosevelt Boettiger, daughter of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, caught three fine salmon in Cowichan Bay, near Victoria, on an 8-ounce flyrod. Two of them weighed fourteen pounds each, and one took nearly an hour to land.

Tennis is available on fine courts at-

tached to the Empress Hotel, and at other well-kept courts in Victoria and vicinity.

Victoria's Crystal Garden is the largest swimming pool on the Pacific coast, and its heated and filtered salt water is just as comfortable in mid-January as it is in August. Not only golf on sporty, seagirt courses, but fine motor drives along smooth highways skirting the water, including the celebrated Malahat Drive; archery, badminton and all the other summer recreations, make Victoria and vicinity the ideal winter playground. As usual, American visitors can move freely into or out of Canada, and now benefit by an advantageous rate of exchange.
