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Student Body Election Date Set For Jan. 8

January 8 is the date set for the election of the 1940 student body officers, according to I. R. Metzler.

Officers open to election are president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, song leader, pianist, student body manager, editor of the Hummer, business manager of the Hummer, and reporter.

Student body president must be a senior boy or girl, the student body manager may be selected from any boy of the junior or senior class.

Any member of the associated student body having completed at least one semester of journalism, may be reporter. The editor and business manager of the Hummer will be recommended by the journalism class and elected by student ballot.

The pianist will be recommended by the glee club instructor, and the song leader may be anyone of the associated students.

Young Corrigan In Senior Class

Paul Dickman, youthful plane-builder, has purchased a 1935 "cub" fuselage intending to rebuild the plane in the school shop. He hopes to have it in the air by June 1940.

The fuselage, which cost Paul \$120 is licensed by the Civil Aeronautic authority and will be given a national commercial license enabling him to fly it anywhere in the United States without restriction.

Paul stated that he can buy wheels and a 40 h.p. motor, build a set of wings and elevators and completely fit it for flying for approximately \$250.00.

The "cub" which was built by the Taylor Aircraft company is a high-winged monoplane seating two in a tandem arrangement. It has a top speed of 95 m.p.h. and cruises at 68. It's cruising range is 250 miles on 11 gallons of gas.

Bob Jenne, another armed senior who is building a Longster at the Beaverton airport recently purchased a 40 h.p. Continental motor for \$115.

The motor, if installed in his Longster, would give it a cruising speed of approximately 85 m.p.h. and a top speed of 105.

Bob expects to have his "Dream Girl" flying by June.

230 Students Take Tuberculin Test

Two hundred thirty three students took free tuberculin tests administered by Dr. N. S. Sherwin as the first step in an intensive battle waged against tuberculosis this month, according to Miss Virginia Pierson, county health nurse.

Ten percent of the total number were positive cases. Usually this means that the person has come in contact with an open case of tuberculosis, reported Miss Pierson. She added that open cases are often found through these tuberculin tests.

She visits the home and takes X-Rays of positive cases. Grade school students took the test December 13.

Christmas seal sales pay for the tests stated the county health nurse.
