# **Pedestrian Fatalities**

auto pedestrian accidents during the month of December. This was 43 percent of the total traffic death toll for the month. Of the 16 pedestrian fatalities, nine, or 56 percent occurred in urban areas while of the seven rural fatalities, six were on beavily traveled roads and one Crossing highways accounted for four of the seven rural pedestrian deaths while two persons last year. were killed while walking along
