

HOME OWNERS FORUM

WHEN built-up roofing has been ripped and torn, loose sections should be secured with plastic roofing cement applied evenly with trowel or like implement.

When blisters form—caused by the separation of felt layers or loosening of roofing from base sheathing—split the blisters and spread roofing cement thickly over under surface and apply pressure for several hours to assure firm setting.

Scatter sand over exposed areas if tar or cement remains sticky.

Q.—Suggest formulas for producing the following colors from white lead paint: buff, lemon yellow and medium green.

A.—To produce a pleasing buff add 1 pt. raw Italian sienna plus 1/4 pt. burnt turkey umber to paint mixed from 100 lb. paste white lead.

Lemon yellow is produced by adding 1/4 pt. C. P. lemon chrome yellow to paint mixed from 100 lb. paste white lead.

If varying quantities of paint are mixed, adjust formulas in proportion. Whether following a formula or matching a particular shade, mix in only small quantities of the colors-in-oil at a time to avoid "overdosing," which results in wrong color and waste.

The darker colors such as medium green are not prepared from white lead paint. The colors-in-oil are reduced to painting consistency by the addition of raw linseed oil and outside spar varnish. However, apply the regular white lead undercoats tinted to a medium shade of the finishing color.

Suggested volume formula for medium green: 2 parts C. P. chrome green medium, 3 parts raw linseed oil, 5 parts spar varnish. One gal. of color will yield 3 3/4 gal. of paint to which add 1 pt. of drier.

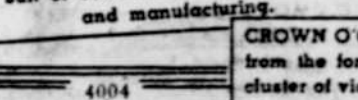

County Agent Discusses Fertilizers

paster is generally desirable. The season has much to do with the advisability of using landplaster also. When there is a rank, early growth probably the landplaster should be left off.

Boron is recommended particularly for alfalfa where there is or has been considerable yellowing of the tops of the plants in the growth after the first cutting. Applications of borax at the rate of 20, and never to exceed 30, pounds per acre have in some instances in Washington county completely eliminated the yellow tops and leaves and increased the yield as much as 200 percent in the second and later cuttings. Except in a very dry spring season the boron deficiency will not be evident in the first cutting.

Boron should never be considered as replacing either phosphate or landplaster. It functions entirely, and serves an entirely different purpose. It can best be applied by mixing it with the landplaster or sometimes phosphate. The small quantity that is used per acre makes it almost impossible to put it on alone and get it applied evenly.

Ammoniated phosphate has been a popular fertilizing material the last few years and has proven very desirable on pastures, grass crops and lawns. Its use is not confined to these crops but it is perhaps used most widely in connection with them. Whether ammoniated phosphate analyzing 16-20-0 or 11-48-0 is used depends upon the crop being fertilized. Where no phosphate has been used the last two or three years probably the kind carrying the greater quantity of phosphate should be used. The designations just

used refer to the percentages of nitrogen, phosphate and potash, respectively. On grass pastures or seed crops that have not received prior applications of phosphate probably 150 or more pounds of 11-48-0 will be very satisfactory. Where phosphate has been applied recently the 16-20-0 at the rate of 150 to 200 pounds should be adequate. On pastures generally probably the latter material is desirable. On lawns the 16-20-0 is an excellent fertilizer but should be applied at the rate of approximately two pounds per hundred square feet. When used on a lawn considerable care should be taken to get it off the grass itself after it is spread, and down into the ground. It is caustic and if it remains on the grass any length of time will probably result in more or less burning.
