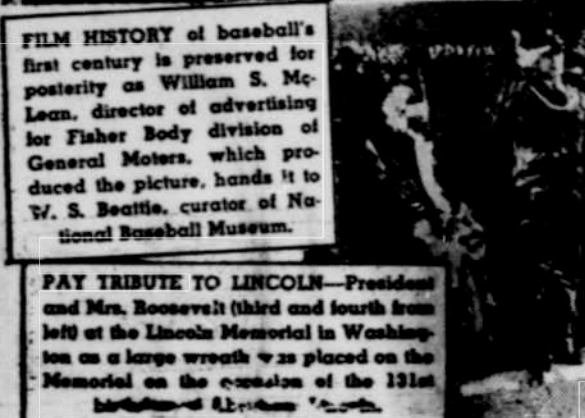

University of Oregon, Eugene, Feb. 21 (Special)—Among those to complete solo flights in the University of Oregon's student flight training program is Clarence Zurcher, Beaverton. A total of 33 students have thus far completed their initial lone flights.

Only after students have definitely proven themselves capable of handling a plane alone will instructors solo their students. Stressing absolute safety, when the instructor is confident of the student's ability, he administers a "check flight," a last trip as a general check up and allows the solo if conditions are right.

Zurcher, a graduate of Beaverton high school, is a senior majoring in business administration at the university. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter J. Zurcher and is affiliated with Delta Upsilon.
