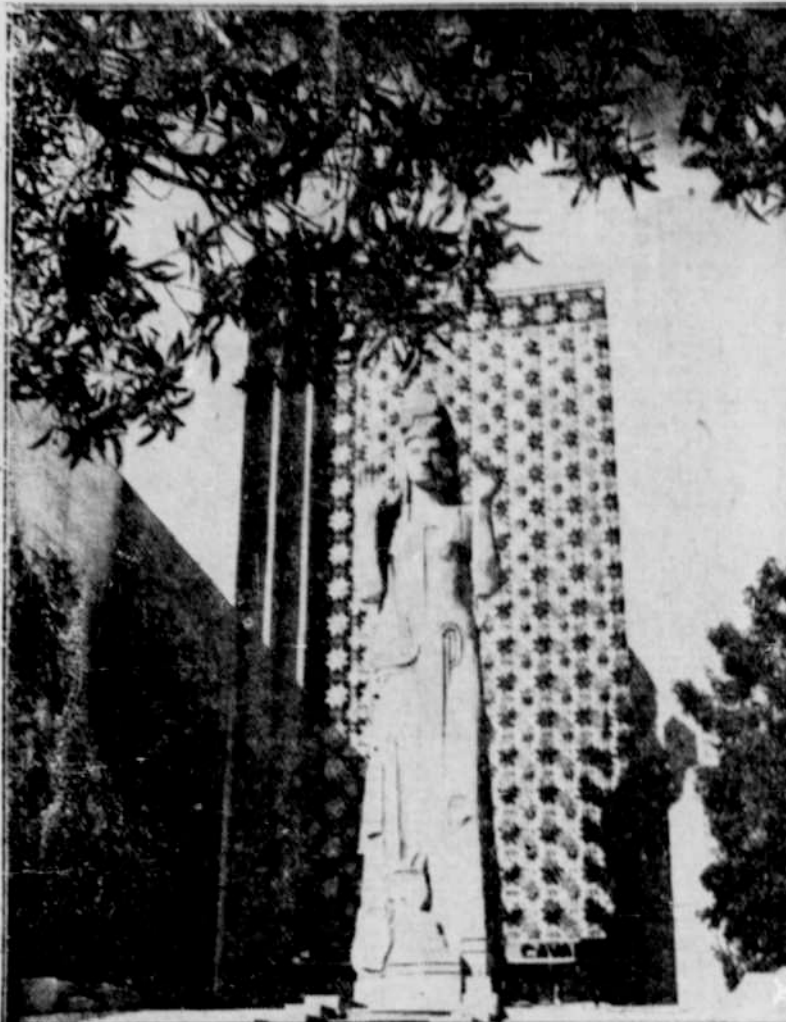

First Impressions



First impressions are said to be lasting. Remember this when preparing your menu. In the illustration above, a very simple dessert has been attractively decorated with an equally simple sauce—resulting in a dish so attractive and appealing that it sells itself immediately.

This particular dessert continues to gain in favor when actually sampled. Its flavor is delicious enough to live up to that first impression. Furthermore, it is an economical dessert that calls for no eggs, no baking and no boiling; it may be prepared with ease; and it is particularly healthful. Surely these qualities entitle it to a regular place on the menu.

Chocolate Rennet Custard with Coffee Sauce

1 pint milk (not canned or soft curd)
1 pkg. chocolate rennet powder
1 tablespoon butter
1/2 cup confectioners' XXXX sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 tablespoon strong coffee infusion
Few grains salt
1/4 cup whipping cream
Make rennet custard according to directions on package. When ready to serve, top with the following coffee sauce:
Cream the butter until very soft; then gradually work in the sugar, adding the vanilla and coffee little by little if mixture becomes too stiff. Beat until mixture is perfectly smooth. Stir in salt. Whip cream. Lightly but thoroughly fold in the whipped cream. Pipe or drop a portion of this sauce in the center of each rennet custard just before serving, and garnish with shaved blanched pistachio nuts if desired. Makes 4 to 5 servings, depending on size of sherberts.

HOME OWNERS FORUM

MODERN home styling often requires that metal gutters, leaders, and flashings be painted to blend more favorably with the general decorative theme.

First apply a priming coat of red lead paint which, because of its unsurpassed affinity for metal, will provide the firmest, most durable foundation for whatever finish applied. Red lead paint is widely distributed in ready-mixed form, or may be prepared on the job from the pure ingredients.

Follow with body and finish coats prepared and tinted according to the same formula used for siding and sash.

Simplified volume formula for body coat when paint is mixed on the job: 1 part soft paste white lead, 1 part half and half linseed oil and turpentine.

Follow with finish coat of equal parts soft paste white lead and linseed oil.
Add 1/2 pt. liquid drier per gallon.
Q: Such remedy for leather upholstery which is cracking due to steam heat.

A: Rub on a liberal supply of plain white vaseline or neat's-foot oil. Rub in well until leather has absorbed all it will hold. Remove excess by wiping with clean, soft cloth.

Some people prefer to use a dressing composed of 2 parts raw linseed oil to one part vinegar, finishing off with chamois skin. Rub to obtain polish.

Q: How should linoleum be fastened to the floor? Is a pad necessary?

A: Glue linoleum to a felt paper covering which in turn has been glued to the floor. This provides a cushion besides facilitating removal when necessary.

Always lay linoleum over a smooth, even floor, as roughness will inevitably cause wear and trouble.
