

Prepare Saint Patrick Surprises

Shamrocks, pipes and other suitable decorations are proper for the Saint Patrick's Day dinner table. A touch of green is desirable in or on one or two of the foods. And by all means serve new dishes — tasties that will honor the good old Saint and please the guests as well. Here are some suggestions:

Limas and Lamb Stew
(a one dish meal)

1 cup dried Limas
2 pounds of lamb cut into cubes
2 small potatoes, sliced
1 small onion, sliced
1 cup canned corn
1 cup strained cooked tomatoes
Sear the meat cubes in bacon fat. Put cubes, onion and potatoes into a covered saucepan, cover with boiling water and simmer gently for 1½ hours. Add Limas, corn and tomatoes. Bring to the boiling point, and cook 5 minutes. Cover closely and cook slowly for about 3 hours.

Lemon Angel Pie

4 egg yolks
¾ cup sugar
Cream together thoroughly. Add:
¾ cup lemon juice
Cook in double boiler until thickened (about 10 minutes), stirring often. Add:
1 tablespoon butter
Remove from heat and fold in:
2 whites, stiffly beaten
Pour into an 8-inch baked pie shell. Top with meringue made with 2 remaining egg whites. Brown in moderate oven (325° F.) for 15 minutes.

Minted Pineapple Gems

Drain a fourteen ounce can of Hawaiian pineapple gems — spoon-size cubes cut from the juiciest part of the fruit. To the syrup add green vegetable coloring, drop by drop, until the desired color. Add peppermint extract until syrup is of desired flavor. Stir well, heat and add pineapple gems. Simmer gems until they have absorbed most of the syrup and taken on

a green color. Use as a garnish for the center of a crown roast of lamb or serve from a tray of assorted relishes with the meat course.

Magic Fudge Balls

1½ squares unsweetened chocolate
¾ cup sweetened condensed milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup confectioners' (4X) sugar
1 cup nut meats, finely chopped
Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Add sweetened condensed milk and stir over boiling water 5 minutes until mixture thickens. Remove from heat and add vanilla. Add confectioners' sugar. Allow to cool thoroughly. Form in small balls and roll in nut meats until well covered. Makes 24. Additional nut meats, raisins, or dates may be worked into these, if desired.

St. Patrick's Brew

Use 1 heaping tablespoon decaffeinated coffee, regular grind, and ¼ tablespoon beaten egg for each cup (½ pint) cold water. Combine coffee and egg in pot and mix thoroughly. Pour in water and bring slowly to a boil, stirring coffee down occasionally. Remove from fire immediately and let stand in warm place 3 to 5 minutes. Pour ¼ cup cold water into pot to settle. Strain from the grounds through a fine wire strainer, muslin, or cheesecloth. (Boiled coffee may also be prepared without the egg.) You can serve the longest for second and third cups without any qualms over sleeplessness if you make your party brew with decaffeinated coffee.

Recipes for Party Fun

Light hearted games continue to head the list of party favorites. The best selling game this winter is Contack, the new match making game.
