April 4th Ends CCC Enlistment Period

On the fourth of April the quarterly allotment for enrollment in the CCC will be completed. The qualifications for enrollment are the same as they have been for any unemployed youth between the ages of 17 and 23 yrs. a citizen of the United States, in good physical condition and of good character. Opportunity will be given for vocational training as well as employment.

The CCC is not a military organization, and relief status is not necessary for acceptance. There are also vacancies in the Veterans' contingent of the CCC, for which any honorably discharged veteran who is physically fit and of legal age is eligible for enrollment and should write for an application blank to Dr. Paul I. Carter, Manager of the Veterans Administration, Portland. The next replacement period begins April 1, and ends April 20.
