My Testimony to the Bible  
The Bible is the Word of God. Evidence that this is true is found in the book itself. Any person who will study its contents with a friendly and impartial mind can be assured of this fact. There is also much convincing external proof.

The Bible was written by more than thirty different men during a period covering over fifteen hundred years. It was written in three different languages, by persons from every social plane, including herdsmen, fishermen, and kings. Some writers were highly educated and others were unlearned. There was no master human mind to plan and guide their writings. There are 66 books in the group. Yet there is complete unity throughout. Apparent contradictions are only on the surface. The central theme is the Lord Jesus Christ; and there is a steady growth in organic character and revelation from Genesis to the last book. We must conclude that the writings were inspired and the mind of God was behind them.

If the Bible was the product of uninspired writers, then we should be able with all our present education and historical background to produce a better book. None has been produced during the nineteen centuries since the Bible was completed. It seems completely safe to state that if a group of thirty of the most able and experienced masters of English throughout the

world were selected, brought together and permitted all the time desired to write another Bible superior to the one we have they would be unable to do so. They could not even compose fresh gems equal to the Twenty-third Psalm, the parable of the good Samaritan, or the Sermon on the Mount.

The Bible has been hated and attacked almost from the time it was given to the world. Powerful rulers, brilliant infidels, shrewd philosophers, great ecclesiastical organizations, and many other open and disguised enemies have used every effort to destroy it. Edicts have been made requiring every Bible to be burned and every person having one to be put to death. Yet at the present time the Bible is being printed in nearly one thousand languages and dialects, and it is safe to say that that more copies are in existence than during any previous period. It does not seem possible that an ordinary human book could have withstood such persecution.

In the Bible many future events were foretold. A large number of these prophecies have been fulfilled just as the prophet described them. Some still remain to be fulfilled. In many cases hundreds of years elapsed between the date of prophecy and its fulfillment. This was the case in connection with prophecies regarding the early life, death and resurrection of Christ. Yet the events occurred exactly as they were foretold. Israel and Judah were warned far in advance of their coming captivity. Judah was told that their captivity would last seventy years, which it did. The Jewish people were told that if they continued to reject God they would be scattered throughout the Gentile nations, and that they would become a reproach and a curse among these nations. This prophecy is still being fulfilled at the present day. It was prophesied that near the end of this age they would again return to Palestine and rebuild it. This is being fulfilled in our time. The city of Tel Aviv containing more than 100,000 persons is entirely Jewish and uses the Hebrew language throughout. There are more than 400,000 Jews in Palestine, and millions would go there, if they were allowed to enter. Jesus foretold the destruction of Jerusalem, which was carried out by Titus forty years after the crucifixion. Revival of the Roman Empire is foretold. Mussolini is ambitious to bring this about; and there appears to be excellent prospects that this may be accomplished in the near future. It is evident that the prophets were given their visions of the future by divine inspiration.

The Bible searches human hearts. It exposes man's inner life, his motives, ambitions and evil passions just as it did in the days when it was written. It calls for holy living. That is one reason why it is hated. It transforms lives. Where men have heeded its warnings, accepted its truths and obeyed its teachings, they have found peace of heart, strength to overcome evil habits and power to develop noble character. The best and most helpful works of literature and art, the best in character, family life and government have sprung from the Bible. The United States was founded largely by men who believed in God and accepted the Bible as His word.

Many pleasant and instructive books have been written. Some have had a short popularity; others have been preserved as classics. Usually the books of men are read only once or twice by the same person. Books of science or instruction may be referred to frequently for assistance in gaining knowledge or solving problems. There is only one book, however, that seems always new and fresh to those who love and know it. This is the Bible. It is the one book that shows man how to be free from the burden of sin, how to have peace of heart, and how to be reconciled with his creator. It is so simple that a child can understand it; yet so profound that the greatest Christian students have never fathomed all of its statements. It is complete. No man of sound reason and fair purpose would dare assume that he could add anything to it. If it became necessary to give up all books except one, regardless of my love for books of true science, engineering, biography and literature, the Bible is the book, without question, that I would retain.
