Fishing Season Under Way Saturday

Angler's will come into their own Saturday, April 13, when the 1940 general open angling season, long awaited by hook and line enthusiasts, opens to fishermen throughout Oregon. The season closes on October 15.

The general bag limit for lake and streams this year will be 15 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 15 fish in any one day, or 30 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 30 fish in any seven consecutive days or in possession at any one time.

The six inch limit for trout, in effect for a number of years past, is still in vogue and it is unlawful to take trout under six inches in length.

Restrictions in the coastal tide-water area of a bag limit of cut-throat trout over ten inches to three a day or six in seven consecutive days will be lifted and the general state-wide bag limit will apply to these streams beginning with the opening of the regular season Saturday.

Special regulations apply to certain lakes and streams throughout the state and therefore all anglers are urged to obtain the latest official synopsis of the Oregon angling laws from the nearest license agent before setting forth on a fishing trip.

Fees for licenses for residents of Oregon are \$3 a year while non-residents may obtain licenses for \$5 a year. Juvenile angler's licenses for residents between the ages of 14 and 18 is \$1. A special vacation angler's license for residents and non-residents to angle for a period of two consecutive days will cost \$2.

Any blind person may secure without payment of any fee a license to angle by filing application with the office of the State Game Commission.

Fishing for bass is legal throughout the year in all parts of the state except Oswego lake in Clackamas county, where the bass season extends from April 13 to October 31, both dates inclusive.

Fishing through ice is unlawful in any waters of the state, except for spiny-rayed fish and also in the lakes in Wallowa and Baker counties and the Upper Klamath lake in Klamath county.

Through legislative enactment it is unlawful to fish in any other manner than with an artificial fly in the waters of Davis lake, located in Deschutes and Klamath county; or in that portion of the Deschutes river in Deschutes county, extending from the headwaters of this river at Little Lava lake down-

stream to the first bridge across this river; or in Todd lake in Deschutes county, or in that portion of the Metolius river in Jefferson county from the mouth of Lake creek downstream to the point where bridge No. 99 on the river loop road crosses this river.

Some question has arisen over the opening of the season on the tributaries of the Deschutes river above Bend. The main Deschutes river from the city of Bend to Lava lake will not be open to angling until May 1, but the tributaries of this river, the Little Deschutes and Fall river will be open to angling on April 13th.

All fishermen should remember that it is always unlawful: To angle at any time between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise; to fish by any means other than with hook and line; to use more than one line or line and rod held in the hand; to use more than two blades on a spinner for lake or stream fishing; to use more than three hooks or a line except on floating bass plugs; to sell, or offer for sale or exchange any fish taken with hook and line; to transport or ship game fish without a written permit; to fish without a license on person; to refuse to show license upon demand; to angle within 200 feet of any fishway; to waste wantonly game fish or allow others to do so; to angle on private lands without permission from the owners; to net, trap, spear, gaff, club or shoot fish; to resist or interfere with the duties of any officer enforcing the game laws; and to fail to make a report to the State Game Commission of all game taken during 1939 at the time of making application for the 1940 license.

Try This Orange Lemon Marmalade

This Orange Lemon Marmalade is just the thing to restock pantry shelves as the summer's jams and jellies run low. Slice very thin 2 unpeeled lemons and 4 unpeeled medium-sized oranges. Measure the sliced fruit and add three times as much water. Mark water line with pencil on inside of kettle. Boil 45 minutes. Replace liquid boiled away with water to pencil mark.



Add 1 1/2 cups sugar for each 3 cups of cooked fruit mixture. Cook in 2-cup lots in a large kettle, boiling vigorously until syrup gives a jelly test of thick, reluctant drops from side of spoon (12 to 15 minutes). Now add 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Boil again for about 1 minute and make a second jelly test. Pour into sterilized glasses. Cover with paraffin when cold.



Before pouring into glasses, it is well to cool marmalade 5 minutes, stirring frequently to prevent floating fruit. California Navel oranges are best for this marmalade, being firm-meated, clean-skinned and easy to slice, because seedless. In February and March they are at just the right state of ripeness for fine marmalade.

With Face Like Flint

When Jesus called the Twelve, He included Judas who was to betray Him. For Christ knew what Judas would do. He knew all things from the beginning.

TWO—PETER'S CONFESSION—Three years pass, Jewish leaders reject Christ. He then asks of the Twelve—"Whom say ye that I am?" Peter speaks up—"Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." From that hour Jesus began to teach them that He must suffer at the hands of the Jews and be killed.

THREE—THE TRANSFIGURATION—Jesus takes with Him, Peter, James and John into a high mountain apart. His face did shine as the sun and His raiment was white as light and there appeared before them Moses and Elijah, talking with Him of His death which should occur at Jerusalem.
