

Mocha Halo Cakes Food For Angels!



YOU'LL rate your own personal halo when you serve Mocha Halo Cakes—their heavenly flavor comes from strong, fresh coffee used in the making, and when served with hot coffee—the natural accompaniment—it's the perfect fare for holiday or just general entertaining. Easier to make than they look—here's how:

Mocha Halo Cakes
 1/2 cup shortening 1 1/2 cups sifted cake
 1 cup sugar 1/2 cup cocoa
 1 egg 1/2 teaspoon soda
 1 egg yolk 2 teaspoons phosphate baking
 1/2 cup double strength freshly powder
 made coffee 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup buttermilk 1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream shortening thoroughly, add sugar gradually creaming until light and fluffy. Combine whole egg and egg yolk; beat well; add to the creamed mixture. Reserve the two egg whites for the frosting. Cool coffee and combine with buttermilk. Sift remaining dry ingredients and add alternately with liquid to creamed mixture, mixing well after

each addition. Bake in oiled muffin pans in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 20 minutes. Makes 18 medium or 12 large cup cakes.

Fluffy White Frosting
 2 egg whites 1 tablespoon light
 1 1/2 cups sugar corn syrup
 1/2 cup cold water
 1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring

Place all of the ingredients except the vanilla in the top part of a double boiler. Beat with a rotary egg-beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over boiling water; beat steadily with the rotary beater until the frosting will form peaks when the beater is lifted, 7 to 10 minutes. Remove from heat; add the vanilla. Frost top and sides of cup cakes. Makes enough frosting for top and sides of 18 medium cup cakes.

Future Farmers To Meet

Five hundred students and teachers of Smith-Hughes agriculture, from 53 different high schools in Oregon, will attend the annual FHA convention at Oregon State college April 25 to 27. For some years the attendance has been limited to this figure, being the maximum that can be cared for adequately on the campus.

The executive committee, headed by David Baum of Union, now a freshman at Oregon State, will meet on Wednesday, April 24, to prepare final details and transact business in advance of the general meeting. In addition to a score of work contests, the delegates will also hold state finals in parliamentary procedure and public speaking contests, and will take part in a number of radio broadcasts.

Held in connection with the FHA convention will be the annual Ag fair, conducted by students in agriculture at the college. It will start Friday, April 26, with a parade, to be followed in the evening with a jamboree in the armory, consisting of various races, driving contests, staff members' milking contests, and the like.

Friday night and Saturday each of the 10 departments in the school will operate a booth. Saturday evening the annual "Little International" will be held to pick winners in livestock showmanship. 4-H CLUB SUMMER SESSION DATES SET FOR JUNE 10-21

June 10 to 21 are the dates picked for the annual 4-H club summer session at Oregon State college, when close to 2000 4-H members and leaders are expected on the campus for a two-weeks' session of combined class work and recreation.

An increased number of scholarships have been offered throughout the state the past year by various civic and farmers' organizations, and business concerns. All first prize winners of last year's state fair will also be included in those who have won free scholarships.



(From page 1) ing out that these odds mount steadily through the various age groups. The odds for death were computed on a basis of the total of pedestrians of given age groups involved in accidents and the resulting number of deaths and injuries for those age groups.

Here are your chances in case you are involved in a pedestrian-auto collision:

0 to 4 age group, one accident in every 63 results fatally to pedestrians.

5 to 14 age group, one out of every 21.

15 to 24 age group, one out of every 16.

25 to 39 age group, one out of every nine.

40 to 54 age group, one out of every eight.

55 to 64 age group, one out of every four.

65 and over, one out of every four.

"These figures emphasize the need for constant caution on the part of the elderly pedestrian as he walks along our highways, crosses streets or otherwise places himself in the path of motor vehicle traffic," Snell declared. "Less agile persons should avoid any contest with the speed of modern cars. Remember, a car traveling at only 27 miles an hour moves eight yards for every one yard the pedestrian covers and at such relative rates of speed, a car is likely to reach a pedestrian before he anticipates his danger."

"The significant thing about this pedestrian age-group study, however, is that it reveals the high rate of fatality incident to accidents involving the older persons. Younger people are more likely to escape with injuries, but the older one gets, the greater the chance the accident will prove disastrous."

There are 266 persons over 55 years of age struck by cars during the year 1939, and of this number 65 or 24 percent were killed. On the other hand, there were 315 persons under the age of 14 hit by cars and only 13 or four percent were killed.

Fifty-seven percent of the pedestrian fatalities in Oregon during the past year involved persons 55 years of age or older and many of these persons were committing an unsafe act at the time they were struck by cars, figures on accidents on file at the secretary of state's office show. Crossing between intersections, walking diagonally across an intersection, crossing against the traffic light, crossing highways without making sure no cars were near, walking on the right side of the road instead of on the left facing traffic, stepping out into the street from between the parked cars, and playing or working on a car in the roadway constituted the majority of these unsafe actions.

(Continued from page 3) ground limestone containing 90 percent calcium carbonate or its equivalent. Rate of payment per acre for this practice, on the basis of one ton per acre of lime testing 90% calcium carbonate or its equivalent is approximately 20 pounds per acre. Payment that can be earned by this practice alone, or in combination with other practices is limited by the soil building allowance for the farm.

Lime obtained from this, or any other source may be applied to either a depleting or non-depleting crop acreage for a benefit payment, providing the rate of application meets the specifications of this practice. Total payment earned, of course is limited to the soil-building allowance for the farm.

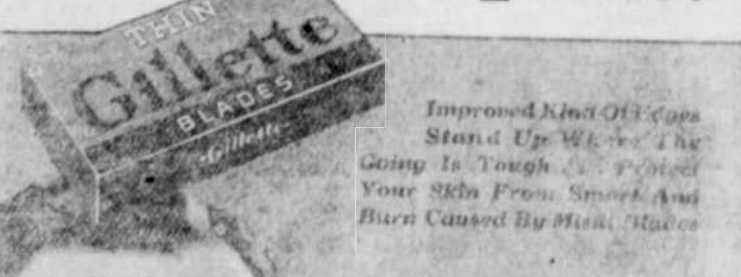
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
