Economy Desserts

HERE is a recipe for a dessert that may be made any time from ingredients always on hand. Let it aside to cool and serve it either at noon or at night—or at the luncheon if you wish. Best of all, it is easy to make, very easy on the pocketbook, and particularly delicious.



Canned Grapefruit Tapioca
4 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca; 2½ cups fruit juice and water; ½ cup sugar; ¼ teaspoon salt; 1 cup canned grapefruit; 2 tablespoons lemon juice.
Combine tapioca, fruit juice and water, sugar, and salt in saucepan and mix well. Bring mixture quickly to a full boil over direct heat, stirring constantly. Remove from fire. (Mixture will be thin, do not overcook.) Add fruit and lemon juice. Cool, stirring occasionally—mixture thickens as it cools. Chill. Serves 6 to 8.

DIGITALIS IS SHIPPED

The first official sampling of digitalis, a plant picked from the coastal sections, apparently ever made in Oregon was taken recently by the state department of agriculture shipping inspectors. An Oregon company asked the department to inspect 1200 pounds of the digitalis, which is used for a drug, and to forward an official sample to the University of Maryland.

Graders Make Report

Statistically speaking, cream graders of the state department of Agriculture conducted this work in March for quality improvement of milk and cream. Made 69 calls at farms; 130 calls at creameries; ran 5,413 sediment tests; condemned 193 cans of milk; 15 cans of cream and 236 milk cans, the latter pending repairs; graded 4,000 cans of cream and ran 158 butterfat check tests.

Y.M.C.A. Teaches Bridge

The SNAPSHOT GUILD
PICTURES ON THE STAIRS

The staircase is often an ideal spot for snapshots at home. In this picture of a small girl off to her afternoon nap, note how an interesting effect of sunshine and shadow has been created by clever placing of photo lights.

IN MANY houses, one of the best picture locations—and one of the most neglected—is the stairway. If you've never taken pictures on the stairs, give some thought to it now—there may be any number of unusual picture opportunities waiting for you.

Several features of the staircase make it a good location for snapshots. In the first place, it enables you to place a subject at different elevations; and in the second place, the pattern of treads and banisters helps provide an interesting or decorative setting. If the staircase is unusual in design, with novel breaks, a curving rail, carving or wrought-iron work, its value as a setting may be even greater.

Many staircases, interesting effects can be obtained.

by proper placing of photo lights. Often, lighting effects may be evolved which suggest daylight, an interesting example of how shadow can be utilized to create a picture above.

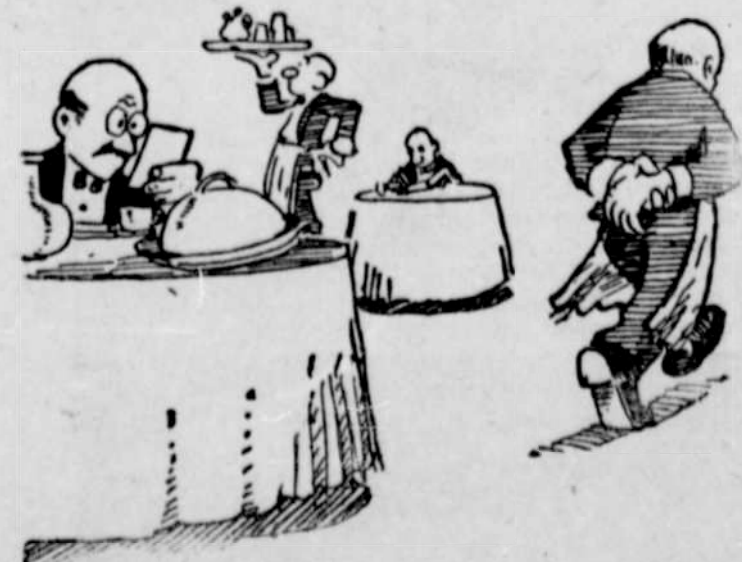

The TRUTH
on the P.U.D.

An open letter to the citizens of Washington County

We have been forced into a political issue. Advocacy of a Washington County P.U.D.—to come up for vote May 17—has brought forth many reckless, irresponsible claims. It is imperative that voters should know the truth on the P.U.D. issue. It is in your interest that you give serious consideration to these facts:

1. The P.U.D. ballot measure authorizes the P.U.D. commissioners to levy taxes immediately on your property, amounting to 2 mills per year for five years—or a total of approximately \$44,924.
2. The tax money does not have to be spent for electric properties. It can be spent for expenses which the P.U.D. commissioners say are necessary—for lawsuits, fees to attorneys, engineers and other "experts".
3. No P.U.D. anywhere has ever sold electricity as cheaply as your present rate.
4. The lowest P.U.D. rate is 13% to 29.6% higher than your present electric rate. For example, the rate for 50 kilowatt-hours a month is \$1.75 here, but the same amount of electricity costs \$2.25—28% more—in the lowest P.U.D., (Mason County, Wash., P.U.D. No. 1).
5. The P.U.D. ballot measure would authorize the P.U.D. commissioners to levy immediately a special tax of two mills a year for five years—even before the P.U.D. issues bonds to buy a utility system. The P.U.D. can load new taxes on to your property, but there is no requirement that it ever need operate an electric utility.
6. Formation of the P.U.D. will be the first step toward more bonded debt. The law allows unlimited amounts of "revenue" bonds to be issued. The bonds will be a mortgage on your electric bills.
7. The law allows P.U.D. general obligation bonds to be issued up to 10% of the assessed value of all the property in the district. This means \$2,246,220 of general obligation bonds that could be issued as a mortgage on your property.
8. The P.U.D. commissioners can use their taxing power (\$44,924 in five years) to build a "war chest" for propagandizing unthinking voters into saddling the community with an added bond burden.
9. Your present rates are the lowest in the entire United States offered uniformly by a distributing system over such a large city, suburban and farm area as that covered by the P. G. E. system.
10. Everyone knows that it costs more to serve rural districts than densely-populated metropolitan areas. Washington County rural districts now get Big-City rates. If a P.U.D. is formed you will be cut off from a system which, because it serves the most densely populated area in Oregon, is able to bring you lower rates than any rural district operating by itself could possibly offer. The higher rates of all existing P.U.D.s—everyone of which charges more than the rates you are now paying—prove the truth of this statement.
