America's youth. In order to focus attention on such policy change, young leaders in their 20's and 30's must replace the repudiated old guardsters in their 50' and 60's. Young voters coming of age during the last decade have held the belief that the Republican party's chief aim is to impede social advancement—this impression must be eradicated by progressive policies backed up by action. Republicanism must again become the political faith of farmers, white-collar men and women, laborers, and small businessmen.

BIOGRAPHICAL DATA: Weed, for some time, has been Agriculture's representative on the Oregon State Board for Vocational Education, taking an active interest in the Future Farmers of America training and progressive program. He, himself, has achieved national recognition as a plant breeder. Sunset Magazine for May, 1939, published his picture and ran a lengthy article on his success in hybridizing flowers. The August, 1940, issue of House and Garden, large national monthly, will contain a series of 8 photos showing Weed at work hybridizing in his gardens.

Weed was graduated from Oregon State Agricultural College. Later, while building up an extensive national mail-order business in perennial plants—one of the five largest of its kind in the United States he attended night school at Northwestern College of Law, from which he was graduated with an LL.B. degree and shortly thereafter passed the Oregon State Bar examination.

In 1938, while competing with Multnomah and Clackamas county States Senator, Weed carried 25 of Oregon's 36 counties, losing two others by six votes.

MARKING TIME

Business is marking time. The downward trend evidently recently has been checked in most lines, but no significant upward trend has yet appeared.

Steel production is at a materially lower level than last year—the largely to the fact that production was ahead of consumption in 1939.

Automobile production is running ahead of the level of a year ago, and late estimates indicate that 4,250,000 cars will be made this year, as against 3,750,000 in 1939.

Domestic construction goes ahead. This year's houses generally are smaller and slightly cheaper than last year's houses. The result is that while more dwellings are being erected, the total value is somewhat less.

Most businessmen have given up hope of any big "war boom." This time Allied purchasing is orderly, and excessive prices are not being offered.

FARM GROUP CONVENTION

Large conventions of agricultural groups scheduled for May include the Oregon Farmers Union at Hillsboro May 21 to 24 and the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' Association at Pendleton May 15 and 16, reports Director J. D. Mickle of the state department of agriculture.

Also, the springs meeting of the Oregon Nurserymen's association will be held May 2 and 3 on the state college campus in Corvallis.

The following month will bring the state grange convention, scheduled June 10 to 14 at Salem.

An Oven Meal Saves Time



FOR any day from Monday through Friday and even on Sunday, an oven-cooked meal is tops for dinner. And it offers many practical advantages: first, it saves a surprising amount of time because the burner of a modern gas range operates with an automatic heat control for perfection of baking with economy of fuel; there is free circulation of air throughout the oven preventing an interchange of flavors. Scarcely any attention need be given the foods while they bake, and there is a wide variety possible.

Roast loin of pork is a delicious piece de resistance. It may be placed in the preheated oven at a temperature of 350 degrees and roasted 30-35 minutes to the pound. Or the cold start method may be used with the same temperature set on the heat control—adding 15 minutes to the roasting time. One hour before the roast is done, add a cascade of sweet potato stuff, cauliflower in a covered pan, and crisp-crisp dried apricot pie, placing the foods on the racks as indicated in the above illustration.

Camera Fan Shoots Night Circus Brings 'em Back Alive!



IF BOB could only have his way, a-hunting he would go—to darkest Africa in pursuit of big game. But Bob is no millionaire. So he satisfies his hunting instincts by shooting pictures—photos of everything. Bob, you see, is one of America's countless camera fans.

The circus played his town the other night. Bob had always wanted to snare some prize photoflash shots of circus acts. But how to do this, what with his seat in the crowd so far away from his quarry? That was the question. Here is his answer:

He captured circus scenes here shown with the aid of, believe it or not—with midgets. No... not with the help of the familiar circus midget. Truth is, Bob bagged each picture with a single tiny flash bulb no bigger than a walnut. So small yet so powerful is the peewee lamp that photographers are calling it the "mighty midget."

The rest of the story accounting for Bob's success



in getting clear action shots from far away is this. He used high-speed film. He took advantage of the fact that the midget bulb's flash is a point-source of light. This permitted use of a spot-type reflector with the result that Bob was able to rifle a powerful "bullet" of light at his distant targets.



Thus, not only Bob saw the circus, but so did his relatively inexpensive camera. No wonder he "brought 'em back alive."

FORBIDDEN FRUIT

Uzziah, one of the great kings of Israel, came to the throne at the age of sixteen, ruled fifty-two years, and in old age sought forbidden fruit.

Hear the Bible record—On a day Uzziah pressed into the temple of the Lord to offer incense on the altar; a holy service forbidden to any but the priests and punishable by death. Had he not much cattle, both in the low countries and on the plains? Had he not tillers of the soil and vine dressers thru his love of husbandry? And his host of fighting men; 2,600 leaders of valor and a third of a million under them.—"And his fame spread abroad; for he was marvellously helped until he was strong. But when he was strong, his heart was lifted up to his destruction." PRIDE GOETH BEFORE DESTRUCTION.

HIS DOWNFALL—So there in the temple that day, the priests warn Uzziah to go back. But the king's heart fills with anger and no man shall stop him. THEN GOD TAKE A HAND. LEPROSY SETS IN. "And while he was angry with the priests, the leprosy rose up to his forehead. And Azariah and all the priests looked upon him and behold, he was leprous in his forehead, and they thrust him out from hence; yea, himself hasted to go out for the Lord had smitten him. And Uzziah, the king was a leper until the day of his death and dwelt in a separate house, being a leper." So says Scripture. And like any common leper, he must cry, "UNCLEAN, UNCLEAN!" where ever he might go. In leprosy, the flesh rots until death comes to end it all. So leprosy is set in the Bible as a type of sin for SIN BREAKS DOWN THE INNER MAN.
