MAKE A PICTURE SERIES



This young gossip is an ideal subject for a picture series. Try your hand at story-telling "sequence pictures"—they provide lots of snapshot fun.

FOR real camera fun, try your hand at taking a picture series—a group of pictures that fit together and tell a connected story.

It's easy to do—easier than taking the same number of individual, unconnected pictures. And because the shots work together, each helping the others, the results tend to be more interesting.

The trick is to pick a starting point—and the rest of the series just seems to follow naturally. Pictures already in your album will give you ideas for "series stories." Just look through the album—choose a picture—and ask yourself, "What story could I develop from this?"

For example, consider the picture of the little girl at the telephone, as the starting point for a story series. She's a perfect gossip. Then one might make a sequence of shots—each one with a slightly different expression—as if she were holding a long, gossip conversation. Arrange these pictures in the album,

write an appropriate bit of conversation under each one—and there's a good story sequence.

In this series, the underlines might read as follows: "Hello." "My, when did you hear it?" "He did!" "Oh, she's like that." "I won't tell a soul." And finally, as she hangs up the telephone receiver—"The cat!"

Naturally, you don't have to take the pictures in their final order. Shoot the expressions or actions as they occur—then arrange the prints in the best order to tell the story, when you paste them in the album.

Try a comic sequence showing Johnny at work on a mechanical puzzle—maybe another one of the baby busily reading an adult magazine. Borrow a friend's camera, and let some member of the family shoot a sequence of YOU as you're taking pictures. It's all good camera fun—and you'll enjoy these picture stories when they're arranged in your album, with appropriate captions under each one.

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Landmark Memorial to Carl Schurz



Distinguished German Immigrant Honored by National Park Service

PHILADELPHIA (Special)—Old Custom House, since 1819 an historic landmark adjacent to Independence Square, is today being restored as an Historic Site by the National Park Service for use as an impressive memorial to Carl Schurz, the nation's most distinguished German immigrant.

Ferdinand Thun of Reading, Pa., president, and Wilbur K. Thomas, of Philadelphia, executive director, announced that the building will become national headquarters of the non-political Foundation honoring the memory of the great liberal, Carl Schurz, who became the confidant of Abraham Lincoln, a Civil War Union general, Senator, member of President Hayes cabinet, and a distinguished publicist.

The Old Custom House was visualized by Mr. Thun as the home of "an institution dedicated to the better integration of the German element in the United States with the rest of the American people." He said that one-fifth of the nation's citizens trace their ancestry to Germany, and that Pennsylvania is the only state possessing a German colonial history.

"This is strictly an American or-

ganization and its objective is better service to the American people," said Mr. Thun, who noted that its founders included Gustav Oberlander, Julius Rosenwald, Victor Ridder and Henry Janssen. "The work is along cultural lines, and is confined to scientific and educational activities."

A reproduction of the Parthenon, with its eight Doric columns and stately statue of Robert Morris, revolutionary hero, gracing its exterior, the structure was once the Second Bank of the United States and for a century thereafter served as the home of the Philadelphia Customs Service.

Threatened with demolition when abandoned by the Customs Service, the 120 year old building was saved when President Roosevelt designated it a National Historic Site, and the Carl Schurz Memorial Foundation offered to maintain it on a twenty year renewable lease.

Work on the restoration began last week by the Works Progress Administration, which will spend \$10,000 installing a new heating plant and stairways, and in repairing and redecorating. The Foundation contributed \$15,000 toward reconstruction costs.

The jury set the fair value of the properties at almost twice as much as the P.U.D. had expected to pay. As a result directors of this P.U.D. have decided to defer further acquisition proceedings.

The proposed Washington County P.U.D. couldn't really get into the electric business until it induced voters, at a later election, to approve hundreds of thousands of dollars of bonds to pay for a distributing system. Meanwhile, the P.U.D. commissioners can collect the \$224,620 in five years for "organizing".
