## F.R.D. Most Popular

Mr. Roosevelt is far and away the most popular of all possible presidential candidates — but there is a definite majority opposed to a third term. That is the rather confusing picture presented by the last poll.

Over 35% of Democrats picked the President, while runner-up Garner got 5.6%. On the Republican side, Dewey led with 14.9%, as against 5.8% for Taft in second place. Fifty-four percent of those queried voted Democratic.

Less than 12% said that Roosevelt's re-election was vital, while almost 21% thought it the worst thing that could happen to the country. On the third term question, says Fortune, the majority against is about 8%.

In the meantime, the political maneuvering goes on. There is a report that the President may back a Hull-Jackson ticket, tho this theory has its doubters, in as much as Mr. Hull has never been considered a New Dealer in domestic affairs. His congressional record was conservative, in the Old-time Southern Democratic tradition.

On the Republican side, the opinion grows that a dark horse may be picked — certainly no candidate with both the voters and the party leaders as well.

Beaverton's flashy cindermen chalked up 75 points at the County track meet at Hillsboro to win the County Championship. 1. My family likes fried onions. Could you suggest a recipe?

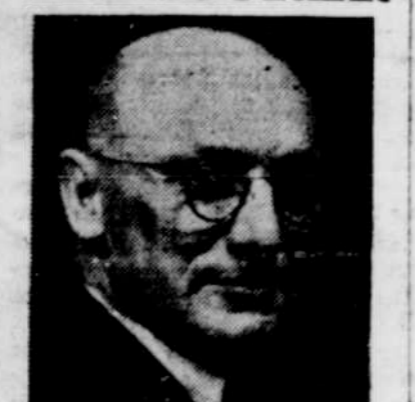
2. How can I keep brown sugar from becoming hard?

1. Slice 4 Bermuda onions in 1/4 inch slices, separate rings, dip in Timbale Batter, fry in deep fat at 370 degrees; a top burner of your gas range will maintain this temperature.
2. Be sure brown sugar is moist when you buy it, then keep it in a mason jar, using a rubber on the jar lid.
3. To prevent boil-overs, grease 3 or 4 inches inside the top of the can and containing the water.

Editor Beaverton Review,  
Dear Sir:

During the past few days the voters have been bombarded with propaganda put out by the private power companies warning them of the terrible calamity that may befall them should they vote to organize a People's Utility district in this county.

They have a terrible worry the five directors may take from you everything you own. The spot comes to me, why are these five men any worse than our county officials, or our several school boards of directors.

They attempt to make you believe that if the district is organized, you will immediately be saddled with a lot of bonds. The facts are this is only a vote to organize the District. The question of bonds to be voted on at a later date, and the bill provides for revenue bonds which are not a mortgage on your property, but must be paid from the earnings of the District.

We are also told they can immediately levy a two mill tax each year for five years. The bill provides, "The board may levy and collect taxes for a period of ten years but not to exceed two mills in any one year nor more than ten mills in said ten year period."

When the District is organized it would be necessary to employ engineers to estimate the cost of a distribution system whether it be shaking over the present system or building a new system. Hence the two mill tax and it is doubtful if it would be necessary to levy after the first year. Per \$1,000 assessed valuation one mill would amount to \$1.00 in taxes.

Very few have any idea how many mills the power companies are collecting from them (hidden in the electric light and power bills) each month to pay the cost of the enormous amount of propaganda through personal contact and literature, also the amount you are paying each year to County and State to provide for those who have lost their life savings invested in the \$18,000,000 worthless stock.

They tell us the directors

would not be regulated by the State. I say they would. The voters are the State. The Directors are elected by the voters and if necessary can be recalled by the voters. What voice have you in the election of the Power Co.'s Directors?

The bill also provides that a P.U.D. shall be assessed and pay taxes in the same manner and for the same purpose as the private corporations.

They cite the terrible things happening in the State of Washington. Twenty-five county wide P.U.D.'s have been organized there and five People's Utility Districts in Oregon. That is a terrible thing for the Power Companies. Nevertheless Washington is a much younger state than Oregon, yet a much larger population. Evidently they like it.

There are those who oppose a P.U.D. yet I venture to say our opponents are accepting the rate reduction as made on Jan. 1st, a reduction very evidently made by the private utilities on account of the activities of the various P.U.D. clubs throughout the State. If
