HOME OWNERS FORUM

DIRT and grime, (not grease), are readily removed from wall paper by a putty-like material easily prepared at home by blending four teaspoonfuls baking soda, two cups of flour, five teaspoonfuls household ammonia, with the addition of 1 1/4 cups of water. Cook in double boiler for about 90 minutes. Knead until smooth.

As friction frequently removes the design from some wall papers, test the material on hidden area, turning the putty continuously to present fresh surface to pick up dirt. If color or design is affected, remove surface dust by brushing gently or with vacuum cleaner, as faded areas often are more conspicuous than dirt.

When clean, wipe the wall well to remove putty crumbs. The starchy putty attracts bugs.

Q—How should white pine be painted to prevent surface discoloration due to bleeding knots?

A—In painting knotty white pine, brush priming coat well into surface. Allow to dry thoroughly, then apply two coats of 4 lb. cut orange shellac to all knots to prevent paint discoloration resulting from bleeding. When dry, apply body and finish paint coats.

For best results, shellac should never be applied to the bare wood. Suggested priming coat: 3 parts (by volume) soft paste white lead, 3 parts pure raw linseed oil, 2 parts turpentine.

After applying shellac, follow with body and finish coats of 3 parts soft paste white lead, 4 parts lead mixing oil, 1 part turpentine.

Add 1/4 pint of drier to each gallon of paint prepared with raw linseed oil. Lead mixing and lead reducing oils require no drier.

For colors, add colors to oil in ratios named above.
