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### As a Chinese Student Sees Himself

MORE than fifty per-cent of China's students are still studying, despite the war which rages about them, because Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek has urged them to remain at their lessons rather than to go to the front. "We want more technical men and more scientists," the Generalissimo has said. The students, he explained, are important to the plan of building a strong China, while the war of resistance is being waged.

Many of the students—both girls and boys—have had to walk thousands of miles on foot to reach sections of the country beyond the range of Japanese gunfire. They carry their books with them, and stop in fields to study between air raids. They have set up new schools, building dormitories with their own hands. Many of them have been cut off from any financial aid from their families. American students are helping, by collecting textbooks for the colleges in China, and by sending financial aid. Textbooks and funds are handled by the Far Eastern Student Service Fund, at 347 Madison Avenue, New York, whose sponsors include many American college presidents and deans.

But the Chinese students are their own best support. They continue to study hard, because the future of China rests upon their shoulders. They are conscious as important to the nation as the fighting forces.
