### CREATING OF PARK IS OPPOSED

Opposition to the creation of the proposed Cascade Ridge National Park, extending along the summit of the Cascade range from the Canadian line to the Mexican border was expressed by the Oregon State Game commission at its last monthly meeting.

The commission voted to concur resolutions adopted by the Washington State Sportsmen's Council.

Creation of the proposed park would remove control of all wild life in this area from state control, and, according to the resolution, the proposed action is another step in Governmental encroachment on state rights.

Copies of the resolution are being forwarded to Pacific coast members of Congress with a request that the plan be fought.
