CIVIL SERVICE TO EXAMINE APPLIERS

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examination for the positions listed below. Applications must be filed with the Commission's Washington office not later than the days specified on each case. Two closing dates are given on some occasions. The first date is given for receipt of applications from States east of Colorado; the second, for receipt of application from Colorado and States westward. The salaries given are subject to a retirement deduction of three and one half per cent.

Bilingual stenographer, \$1800 a year, Department of State. Optional languages include Spanish and French, Spanish and

Portuguese, English and Portuguese. Applicants must have reached their eighteenth birthday but must not have passed their fifty-third birthday. Closing dates for receipt of applications are July 29 and August 1, 1940.

Visual information specialist, \$3,800 a year; associate, \$3,200 a year; assistant, \$2,600 a year. Except for the substitution of additional experience applicants must have completed a 4 year college course, and must have had experience in presentation and interpretation of facts by means of visual materials, such as exhibits, charts, photographs etc. Applicant must not have passed their fifty-third birthday. Closing dates for this examination are July 29 and August 1.

Marine surveyor, \$3,200 a year United States Maritime Commission. Applicants must hold a United States license issued by the department of Commerce, either as chief engineer or as master, of ocean vessels of any gross tonnage, and must have had certain appropriate experience. Applicants must not have passed their fifty-fifth birthday. Closing dates are July 29, and August 1.

Inspector, welding, \$2,600 a year, The Panama Canal, for duty in the Continental United States. Applicants must not have passed their fifty-fifth birthday. Closing dates are July 29, and August 1, 1940.

Senior engineering aid (topographic), \$2000 a year, U. S. Geological Survey. Except for certain substitution of additional experience, applicants must have completed certain high school study, and in addition, must have had responsible civil engineering experience partly on topographic field surveys. Certain engineering study in a college may be substituted for part of the experience. Applicants must not have passed their fifty-third birthday. For this examination applications must be received by December 31.

Engineering draftsman, (ordnance), \$1800 a year; chief, \$2,600 a year; principal, \$2300 a year; senior, \$2000 a year; assistant, \$1620 a year; Navy Department and War Department. Applicants must not have passed their fifty-third birthday. Applications can be sent till June 30, 1941.

Inspector, engineering materials, \$2000 a year; senior, \$2600 a year; junior, \$1800 a year; Navy department, for duty in the field wherever assigned. Except for the partial substitution of experience as aircraft mechanic or aviation engine mechanic, or certain engineering study in a college, applicant must have had experience in the inspection or testing of aeronautical engineering materials. They must not have passed their fifty-third birthday. Applications can be sent till further notice.

Associate aircraft inspector, (factory) \$2900 a year; associate air carrier maintenance inspector, \$2900 a year. CAA. Applicants must possess a valid aircraft mechanic's certificate and engine mechanic's certificate of competency, and in addition, must have had certain responsible experience in connection with aircraft manufacture or repair. Applicants must have reached their 24th, but not their 53rd birthday. Apply till further
