GROWERS ADVISED TO GROW VETCH

Austrian field pea seed growers are now asking with considerable frequency the question of how much seed they should keep for seeding the coming fall. Dealers throughout the county report to County Agent W. F. Cyrus that as the 1940 crop is cleared, growers are puzzling over how much seed to reserve for seeding the 1941 crop.

In answering that kind of an inquiry, Cyrus states that we would all like to know if the AAA pea and vetch seed purchasing program will be continued for another year. Opinion among the AAA officials in this state apparently is to the effect that the program will be continued. At present, it appears that not any of the officials are willing to commit themselves on that point. Announcements have been made unofficially that the legume seed purchasing program will be settled before the first of September.

In any event, it appears that it would be inadvisable to increase the local acreage of Austrian field pea seed for 1941 harvest. Probably a better policy would be to stabilize its production on land where more desirable yields can be expected. Each year, crop yields and the problem of insect pest control support the belief that this seed crop should be rotated just as any other crop, and that it should not be planted year after year on the same land.

Perhaps if that were consistently done, the question of acreage for 1941 harvest would almost take care of itself.

It appears probable and desirable that for the present we should continue to grow some Austrian field peas.

Farmers who have land that is free of volunteer vetch might give serious consideration to the idea of planting either the Willamette strain of common vetch, or the new alba common vetch, which is the white flowered type, according to County Agent Wm. F. Cyrus. These two vetches

APPOINTMENT TO BE MADE BY MOTT

The First Congressional District of Oregon will have one vacancy at the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland, in 1941 and Congressman James W. Mott is anxious that all ambitious young men in his district have an opportunity to try for this coveted position.

have shown desirable characteristics when grown in the South for cover crop purposes and the Willamette strain is already in considerable demand in that section. The alba strain is so new that the trade is not yet familiar with it, but in experimental and other trial work in the South it has to date proved as satisfactory as the Willamette. Consequently, we may expect a demand for it to develop. These two vetches can very well take the place of some of our Austrian field peas on land that is not infested with the old common vetch.

Both of these new strains of vetch are identical in appearance with the ordinary common except for the bloom on the alba strain. Because of the wide difference between the old common and these new strains in respect to hardiness in the south they must be produced under a definite program of certification. Seed of both of these new strains was produced locally this year and is available.

AS PART of the annual spring clean-up, paint-up program some owners find it practical to paint interior flooring where heavy service exposes the wood to dirt, grease and staining necessitating frequent cleaning.

Since high lead content floor paint is impervious to action of water, dirt and grease, any stain upon it is readily removable by simple washing.

If the floor is new, or old but in good condition, merely scrub thoroughly with a hot soda solution to clean-up dirt and grease as well as to remove any surface wax.

If the floor is old and badly worn the original finish should be removed entirely with a paint and varnish remover and scraper. Wipe up any remaining wax by washing with benzene. To neutralize a strongly alkaline remover, wash the floor with a full cup of clean water containing about one pint of strong vinegar. Follow by rinsing surface with clear water.

Mix the paint on the job from the pure paste pigment, oil and thinner to assure quality and quantity.

Apply priming coat composed of 1 parts (by volume) soft paste white lead, 3 parts raw linseed oil, 2 parts turpentine.

Follow with body coat of 5 parts soft paste white lead, 1 part raw linseed oil, 5 parts turpentine.

As finish coat apply 5 parts soft paste white lead, 1 part raw linseed oil, 2 parts each of turpentine and floor varnish.

Add 1/3 pint liquid drier per gallon raw linseed oil in priming coat, 1 pint per gallon raw linseed oil used for body and finish coats.

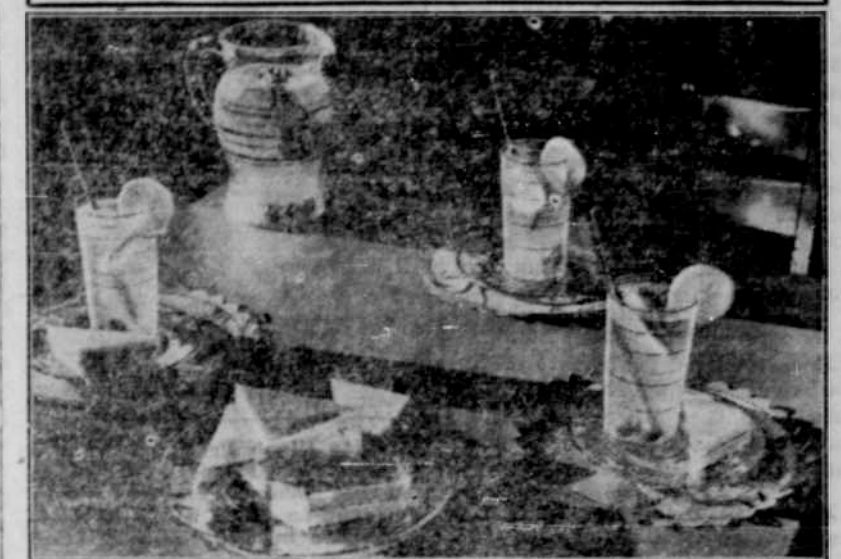

Summer Thirst Allayers

Centuries ago the Chinese were well acquainted with lemonade and accurately styled it "thirst allaying water." They held this drink in such esteem that the White House in the time of the Yuan dynasty, called Li-chi-wan, had an imperial orchard planted with 800 large and small lemon trees to provide lemonade for the imperial family!

Lemonade is still just about the most effective "thirst allayer" on a summer day when the thermometer soars and everyone gasps for a cooling drink. Today, however, no one would dream of boiling the lemon juice according to Chinese custom. Freshly extracted juice directly from the fruit is the first requirement for good lemonade. The longer it stands, the less flavor and health content it has.

Nothing could be purer than the juice in citrus fruits, which is ideal replacement for the water the body loses in perspiration when the sun's rays are over-active. Food authorities recommend fresh fruit juice beverages first as cooling drinks, for they actually mitigate the effects of heat.

When you drink a big glass of lemonade, you really do cool off, research workers have found. Exposure to high temperatures may cause as much as 50 per cent loss in vitamin C from the body tissue. For replacement, nothing is better than citrus fruits, most abundant in vitamin C. Lowered vitamin C reserves go hand-in-hand with "that tired feeling," so keep up your lemonade intake!

For a cool, old-fashioned lemonade that will hit the spot, remember three rules. Use fresh lemon juice and plenty of it. Use ice, and more ice. Don't make it too sweet—it's more refreshing a bit on the lemony side. To sweeten, try honey or sugar and water syrup to get the professional touch.

Note: For recipes, use first the lemonade recipe as given; balance as you wish from this selection or other tested recipes which may appeal to you as suitable.

Nothing is more refreshing than old-fashioned lemonade. For each person allow:

1 lemon
1 to 3 tablespoons sugar or honey
1 cup cold water
Ice
Extract lemon juice. Add sugar to taste. Stir to dissolve. Add water. Serve over ice in large glasses. Garnish with lemon slice on rim and a maraschino cherry if desired.

Lemon Fizz

Make lemonade with carbonated water.

Lemon Float

Add to lemonade a dip of lemon sherbet or lemon frozen cream.

Lemon Shake

Shake together well: 1/2 cup California lemon juice, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup crushed ice (4 ice cubes).

Lemon Ginger Flip

1 lemon, extract juice
1/2 orange, extract juice
Sugar to taste

Crushed ice to fill 1/2 glass

Combine and fill glass with: Ginger ale

Add: Bit of shredded lemon peel

Lemon Eggnog

1 egg white, beaten stiff with

1 tablespoon sugar

1 egg yolk, beaten well with

2 tablespoons lemon juice and

1 tablespoon sugar Milk

Fold three-fourths of the egg white

with sugar into yolk mixture. Pour

into a tall glass and fill with milk,

almost to top. Stir well. Top with

remainder of egg white.

Lemon with Hot or Cold Tea

Correct tea service, hot or cold, includes lemon garnishes. Juicy quarters

should be included as well as decorative

slices. Insert cloves, if liked. For iced

tea, an end of the lemon, sliced to fit

over edge of glass, is admirable.

Grated lemon peel (1 teaspoon for

each 4 to 6 cups) gives either hot or

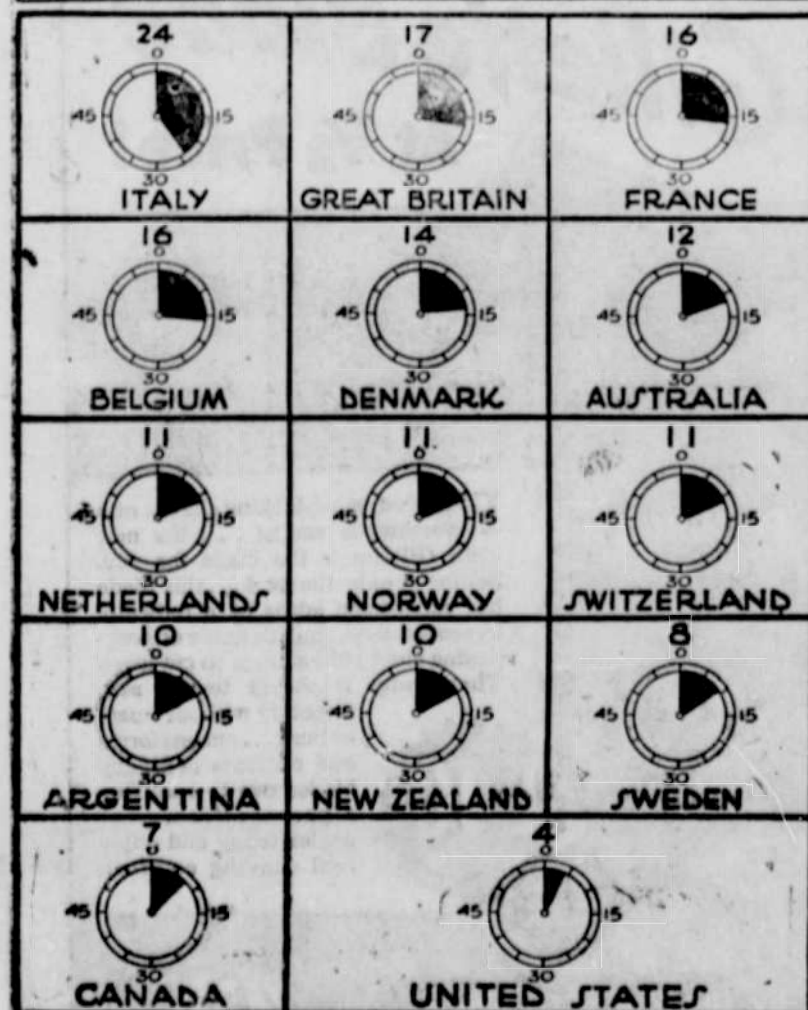
iced tea a delicate flavor and aroma.

Place grated peel in teapot with tea.

Add boiling water. Lemon juice is also

good with black coffee, hot or iced.
