Jelly Making Maxims

ONCE upon a time rhubarb was known as "pie plant." Today we could almost call it jelly-plant for of all good things to be made of rhubarb, this is one of the very best: Ripe Rhubarb Jelly

(Makes about 11 medium glasses)

3 1/2 cups juice
7 1/2 cups sugar
1 bottle fruit pectin

To prepare juice, cut about 3 pounds of fully ripe red-stalked rhubarb into 1-inch pieces and put through food chopper. Place fruit in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure sugar and juice into large saucepan and mix.

Bring to a boil over hottest fire and at once add bottled fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/2 minute.

Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin hot jelly at once.

The More The Merrier

WHEN our forebears coined those old saws, "the more the merrier" and "you can't have too much of a good thing," they must have been referring to a cookie tin crammed to overflowing! But if our grandmothers and our great aunts had known about that modern invention, ice-box cookies, they surely would have burst out with "there's never a good but there might be a better."

An ice box cookie glorified with the goodness of coconut is a supreme triumph in this type of cookie.

Coconut Ice Box Cookies
4 cups sifted cake flour; 3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1 1/4 cups softened butter or other shortening; 1 1/2 cups sugar; 2 eggs, unbeaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 3 cups shredded coconut.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Combine butter, sugar, and eggs, beating thoroughly; then add vanilla and coconut. Add flour gradually, mixing well after each addition. Divide dough in four parts. Place on waxed paper and shape into rolls, 1 1/2 inches in diameter; roll each in waxed paper. Chill overnight, or until firm enough to slice. Cut in 1/4 inch slices; bake on ungreased baking sheet in hot oven (400° F.) 5 to 7 minutes. Makes 12 dozen cookies.

SPECIAL STRAIN OF VETCH DISCUSSED

Willamette vetch, a special strain of common vetch, has passed the baby stage in Washington county seed crops and has become a lusty youngster, says County Agent W. F. Cyrus. This vetch is a selection made several years ago by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and was grown at the experiment station for a number of years. It is somewhat more winter hardy than common, and is especially resistant to both disease and unfavorable growing conditions in the South. Grown for the first time in Washington county on ten acres in 1937, the acreage has steadily increased until in 1940 there was a total of approximately 150 acres, grown by 9 growers. There is additional acreage in Yamhill and Polk counties.

Reports from experiment stations in the South and from others in the same area interested in leguminous cover crops are consistently enthusiastic about this new strain of vetch. Recent reports from Alabama state that it has given more and earlier growth than hairy vetch, and that it has been more disease resistant than either the hairy vetch or the Austrian peas. When varieties and strains of vetches combine early growth with disease resistance in the South they are in popular demand as soon as these qualities become generally understood.

Probably the greatest local difficulty in growing this crop is that of identifying this particular strain from the old, ordinary common strain. If this seed market is developed the identity of this kind must be kept. The old common vetch is unpopular in the South, as it is of almost no value for cover crop purposes. Since this new strain looks exactly like the old it is essential that it be seeded only on land that is relatively free of volunteer vetch. Such land is rather scarce in Washington county and in most of the Willamette valley. Naturally its production has to be followed rather carefully with some kind of a certification program that has been done to date.

Another vetch that is being harvested this year for the first time in any appreciable volume is that of Alba vetch. This is a white flowered strain of common vetch which is easily identified and easily distinguished when in bloom from other varieties and strains. Early trials in the South indicate that it possesses most of the qualities that the Willamette strain has shown. Like the Willamette, to assure the Southern purchaser that he is getting the hardy variety and not common vetch, we will need to produce this under a rather rigid system of certification, says agent Cyrus. The Alba should be planted on ground that is free of volunteer vetch, or at least is as free as possible, and if a considerable volunteering is expected the Alba should not be seeded there.

HARVEST QUEEN CONTEST OPEN

With more than \$275 in prizes offered in the Harvest Queen contest for the Washington County Fair August 29, 30, and 31, only two communities so far are represented in this feature of the county celebration. Funds raised through this contest are used to defray the expenses of the fair.

First candidate in the race was Myreen Purnoy, sponsored by the Aloha Grange, while the second contestant is Donna Fletcher of Forest Grove, promoted by the Future Farmers of Forest Grove High School.

Districts unrepresented are Sherwood, Tigard, Beaverton, Scholls, Laurel, Gaston, Banks, Timber, Dixie Mountain, Helvetia and North Plains.

Five girls can win, while the queen's sponsoring organization will be awarded \$50 in cash, and the first princess's sponsor will receive \$25. The queen will receive her gown and a \$75 diamond and the first princess will be awarded a 17 jewel Elgin wrist watch.

Each of the three remaining girls in the court will receive her gown, while the third prize will be a wrist watch of popular make. Prizes in proportion will be awarded to the remaining two girls.

The contest now open, closes August 28 at 8 p. m. at which time a committee will audit the contest and announce the winners at a dinner to be held in Hillsboro. The coronation ceremony will be Thursday night in the auditorium at the Fair Grounds when the queen will receive her crown as part of the harvest pageant to be staged by the Washington county Granges.

Construction of a new, modern dairy barn to house 150 head of livestock, and repairs and alterations to other buildings costing \$6500, have modernized the fair to a point where it competes with any other county fair of the state.

As a result of this program, larger and more varied exhibits are expected this year. To balance the program of exhibits, a big program of entertainment is being worked out to add variety.

Extra seats have been constructed for 1000 more visitors, and these, with the old seats used a year ago, will be divided between the auditorium and the open air theatre. The theatre was a popular feature introduced last year.
