COMPULSION SEEMS LESS POPULAR

Americans are proud of our heritage of mechanical ingenuity and of our mass production methods by which we have manufactured the necessities and luxuries of life in great quantities. In good years, we have produced approximately 500,000 motor vehicles, which would mean about ten a minute day and night, weekdays and Sundays. And we think nothing of it.

Now that national defense needs are imperative, it is only natural to assume that war necessities could be produced with just as great seeming ease.

From that standpoint, a recent discussion by Alfred W. Sloan, Jr., Chairman of General Motors, sheds interesting light on the problem of mass production for defense. Mr. Sloan expressed confidence that American industry can produce whatever it may be asked to produce.

Lest the impression that miracles can be performed overnight gain credence, Mr. Sloan warns that such an assumption will only lead to confusion in the program and to unnecessary disappointment. He points out that even in the automobile industry, with its long experience in quantity production, the annual model changes require a year's intensive work. In connection with production of defense materials, he indicates the many steps required after the design is agreed upon, and cautions against over optimistic expectations.

The different methods for military training and service by citizen soldiers have not been settled on, but compulsory training seems to be growing more unpopular, and protests against such a system are reaching Senators and Congressmen from the people of their home states.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

OFF-GUARD PICTURES



Provide something for the subject to do, to draw his attention away from the camera—and you'll get more natural pictures.

THE best pictures, as a rule, appear unposed. They seem to have been taken without the subject's knowledge—and the result, of course, is that the subject appears more natural, without any camera-consciousness.

Some subjects are free of camera-consciousness—they can pose quite easily and comfortably for any picture. Others stiffen up and try to "look their best"—or insist on watching the camera—and such subjects must be caught "off guard" if you want a really effective picture.

That doesn't mean that the subject must be wholly unaware of the camera. It simply means that his attention must be drawn elsewhere—focused on some other thing—at the moment of exposure.

One simple solution is to give the subject something to do—something to absorb his attention completely, so he has none left over for the camera. For example, consider the picture above. The small girl is too busy to watch the camera—she must watch Daddy, who is going to catch her. Therefore, while the pic-

ture has obviously been arranged, there is no stiffness. It is a genuine "off-guard" shot.

Another good trick is to place the camera on a firm support, pointing at the subject, and keep your hand on the shutter release while you engage in conversation. For example, suppose you want some shots of Johnny blowing soap bubbles. Place the camera on a lawn table or chair, sit beside it, admire a bubble as it grows, and trip the shutter casually when everything is as you like it. You'll find it easier—and the subject will be more at ease than if you were peering at him through the view finder.

If your camera has a fairly rapid shutter, that's an advantage. Use a shutter speed of 1/100 or 1/150 second, and you won't have to caution the subject to hold still.

Now, load up your camera, pick a subject that has proved "difficult" in the past, and try these "off-guard" methods. My guess is that you'll get more natural, pleasing pictures.

NLRB AMENDMENTS HOUSE PASSES

The House of Representatives got its dander up a few weeks ago, and told the Secretary of Labor and her lady friend Chairman Norton that the National Labor Board had hidden behind

their petticoats long enough. And by a non-partisan vote of about two to one it passed a number of amendments that included a provision to replace the old board with a new one.

Some of the Senators are afraid they may get on the wrong side of the labor vote.

STATEMENT SAYS PAYROLLS BETTER

An official statement from the Department of Agriculture says that improvement in business conditions affecting the domestic demand for farm products continued into July. Industrial employment and payrolls have risen along with the expansion of industrial output since April. The domestic consumer demand for meats, dairy and poultry products fruits and vegetables has been strengthened by this recent stimulation of domestic business.

Eighty one percent of the fatal accidents in Oregon during the month of June occurred in rural areas, according to a summary of the month's accident reports prepared by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

There were 35 deaths during the month, and 624 persons were injured. Accidents totaled 2,802.

Of the 33 accidents in which deaths occurred, 27 were on rural highways, 18 on heavily traveled roads, and nine on lightly traveled highways. There were three fatal accidents in business districts of cities and three in residential areas.

Of the total of 2,802 accidents, only twenty five percent occurred outside urban areas, thus one fourth of all the traffic mishaps of the month caused more than three fourths of the fatalities. Pedestrian fatalities constituted

ted more than 28 per cent of the traffic deaths of the month, non-collision accidents accounted for only 17 per cent. There was one bicycle death and one motorcycle fatality. Sixty percent of the pedestrian killed in accidents were 65 years old or older, and 70 percent of these killed were engaged in some unsafe action at the time they were struck.

Intersections were the scene of nearly half the traffic crashes of the month, but only 15 percent of the fatal accidents occurred at the intersections. Forty eight percent occurred on the straightaway, and 30 percent on curves.

Excessive speed led the list of driver actions contributing to fatal accidents during the month with driving off the roadway second and driving on the wrong side of the highway third. Sixteen fatal accident drivers were in the 15-24 age group, and 15 were in the 25-39 age group, so these two groups accounted for three-fourths of the fatal accidents of the month, from the driving standpoint.

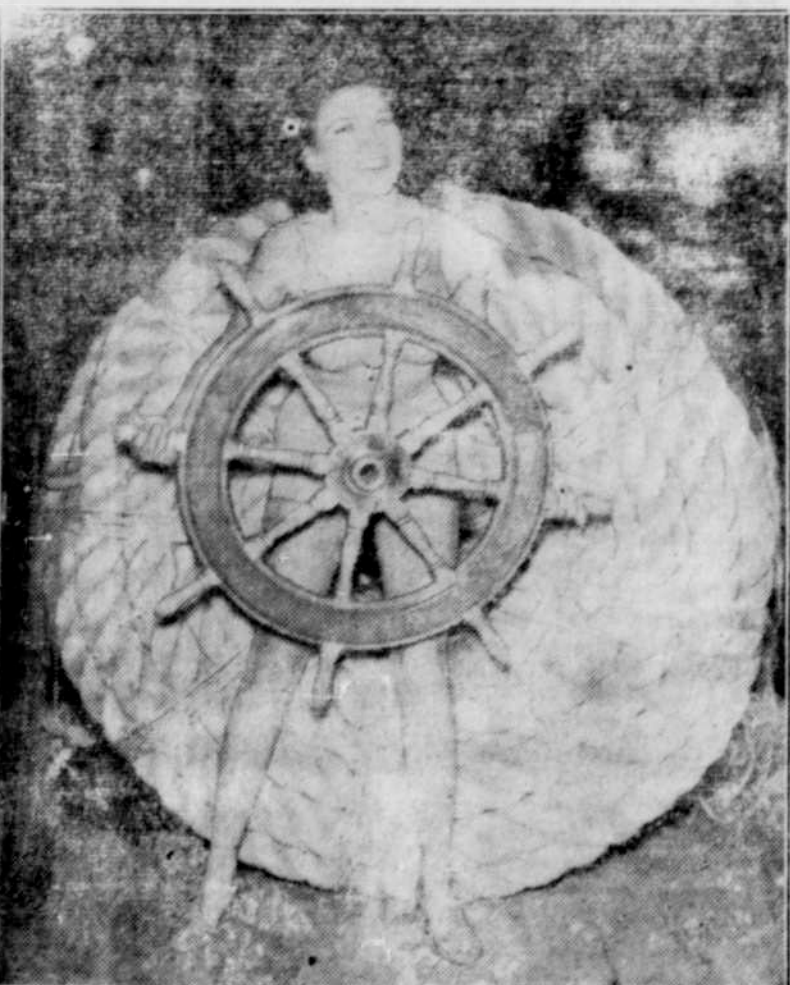
