**GOOD CROP CAN NOW BE INSURED**

Farmers of Washington County who grow wheat can insure themselves a crop for 1941 of 20.5 bushels per acre at a cost of 1.8 bushels per acre. Clyde Kiddle, crop insurance supervisor for Oregon told AAA com-

munity committeeman of Washington County in a meeting Tuesday. The above figures are averages and crop insurance is computed for each individual farm on a basis of the average yield and lost cost for that specific farm. The average yield for the county as set up by the crop insurance corporation is 27.4 bushels and the average premium rate for 75 per cent coverage is 1.8 bushels per acre.

Only 22 local farmers obtained insurance on their 140 wheat crop, according to John W. Kamna, chairman of the county committee. He states that not many of these people anticipated as poor wheat yields as they actually obtained in 1940 but that when they went back and totaled up their average wheat yield for the past ten years and considered the crop insurance program from the same view, that they would consider any insurance program, they believed it was desirable that they take out this insurance. Wheat yields on these insured farms ran as low as six or seven bushels per acre on one spring planting. In most cases, yields were at least a few bushels below the 75 per cent of the average yield. The 75 per cent of an average yield on some places amounted to an insured coverage of approximately 22 bushels and in some other instances to about 17 bushels. Where the yield of wheat on these farms was less than the insured yield, they obtained the wheat to the amount of the difference between the actual yield

and the insured yield. Announcement was made this week by the county committee that notifications of 1941 acreage allotments are being mailed this week by the County office. These notices list not only the acreage allotments for 1941 but also the average yield set up for each farm having an allotment and the crop insurance premium for the farm. Farmers have a 15 day period from the date of the notice in which to file an appeal asking for an adjustment in the figures set up for their farms, according to the county committee announcement.

provisions of the crop insurance and lime and phosphate phases of the program, the local county committee have scheduled a series of 19 community meetings in the county for this week beginning Monday. At these meetings, the crop insurance program will be explained, those operators having wheat allotments are given an opportunity to sign their Wheat Participation Plan for 1941 and mention will be made of the availability of phosphate and lime. August 31 is the closing date for making application for crop insurance covering the 1941 wheat crop.

According to chairman Kamna, the community meetings have been arranged to make it possible for more farmers to become familiar with the crop insurance phase of the program. The county committee believed that by arranging these community meetings the growers would have an opportunity to freely discuss all phases of the program. There are many years when crop insurance is perhaps not needed in Washington County. Likewise, there are many years when fire insurance or life insurance is not needed. Just like these two latter types of insurance, crop insurance for wheat in Washington County may be a convenient thing to have—for instance when there is a freezeout, a loss from rust or hessian fly.

The meetings have been held at various places during the week.



1. Some types of fish tend to broil dry—can I prevent this?

2. How may I get all the juice when I squeeze lemons?

3. Is it necessary to use expensive meats for roasting?

1. Yes!—brush with melted fat, broil 5 minutes on the skin side, 10 minutes on the inside, then finish the last 5 minutes on the skin side.

2. Place lemons in scalding hot water until the skins are soft—cut lemons in half and squeeze. You'll get all the juice, and a lemon squeezer isn't necessary.

3. Inexpensive cuts of beef become tender and well flavored when roasted at low temperature in the fully insulated and ventilated oven of a modern gas range.

**HOME OWNERS FORUM**

CANVAS murals can be applied to any hard, smooth surface with the use of a firm adhesive readily prepared at home by mixing five parts (by volume) quick drying, high quality varnish with six parts white lead.

Spread the mixture in a thin, even coating before laying canvas in place. Roll firmly to assure uniform contact.

Take care to protect the outer surface of murals with a painter's cloth, or a piece of light canvas during the rolling process.

New, unpainted plaster should be allowed at least six months to dry out, or receives a priming paint coat composed of 3 parts (by volume) soft paste white lead and 4 parts red mixing or lead reducing oil before applying adhesive. Unseasoned plaster contains free alkali which tends to keep adhesive from forming firm bond.

QUEST: How can lead flashing be fastened to prevent buckling?

ANS: To avoid buckling due to expansion and contraction cleats—hot nails—should be used to fasten the sheet lead.

Cleats should be of 3 pound hard

wood. Turn one end of each cleat back over the holding nails to prevent the nail heads from causing damage to the lead. Fold the other end into loose-locks between the lead sheets, or—in case of an overlap or lacking joints at a given point—into a hem at the edge of flashing sheet.

Continuous cleats should not exceed eight feet in length to prevent their buckling upon expansion which in turn causes the flashing to buckle and tear.
