## ROLE OF LABOR

The role of labor in national defense is a topic which is causing much thoughtful discussion these days. And labor's best friends have come to the conclusion that it, no less than capital, must make sacrifices in the interests of liberty.

No longer can we afford those costly industrial tie-ups, while labor leaders and management wrangle and get nowhere. No longer can production be deliberately slowed down to conform to the ability of the least efficient workman. And no longer will the public approve a legislative policy which, in effect, starts with the premise that the manager is always wrong and the worker always right in industrial disputes.

The tragic experience of France contains a hard lesson for America. In France, working hours were not increased until the last moment—and that was largely responsible for the nation's incredible weakness. Politics pampered the worker—and politics thus made defeat inevitable.

This does not mean that the worker is to be exploited. It simply means that all factors in our society must give up special privileges—that no man can escape the necessary sacrifices. That is the first step toward security.

## Famous Artist of "Our Democracy" Cartoons

Hubert J. Mathieu, who draws the "Our Democracy" cartoon series, has been nationally known for years as an illustrator of stories and serials in such magazines as the Saturday Evening Post, Colliers, Ladies Home Journal, McCall's, Cosmopolitan.

Mr. Mathieu's first paid job was as a farm hand, and he owns and lives on a farm today. Born in Brookings, S. D., the son of the late Hubert B. Mathieu, dean of South Dakota State College at Brookings, the artist worked as a boy on nearby farms. He graduated from South Dakota State College in 1919. In his years of success he has gone back to the land. He owns and lives on 150 acres in Bucks County, Pa. The farm which

this year has 20 acres in corn, 20 in wheat and 15 in oats, as well as hay and truck, is operated for Mr. Mathieu by his nearest neighbor, on shares. Mr. Mathieu says the farm pays both him and the neighbor.

The series of cartoons "Our Democracy" scheduled to appear weekly in this paper, Mr. Mathieu draws partly on his farm and partly in a studio he rents in New York, where the photograph above was taken.

Mr. Mathieu is of American Revolutionary stock, of French, Dutch and English ancestry. He is married and has four children.

His uncle, Oscar Mathieu, is senior agronomist of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, at Washington.

## CLUB CONTEST GIVES REWARDS

With the rapid increase in electric service in rural areas in Oregon, the national 4-H rural electrification contest affords a real opportunity to club mem-

bers in this state, says Everett H. Davis, extension specialist in agricultural engineering, at OSC.

During the four years that this contest has been held, four Oregon boys have won free trips to the national 4-H clubbers in the state contest have been Eugene Wheeler of Lane county, Edward Weston of Tillamook county, Allen Parker of Multnomah county, and Charles Kik of Umatilla county.

"The national 4-H club rural electrification contest offers recognition and reward to club members for their study of the use of electricity on the farm and in the farm house" said Davis. "The state 4-H club office has approved this contest, and any 4-H club members may enter with the approval of his county club agent. It is not necessary that the members have electricity on their own farms to compete."

A recent national report shows that farm families installing electricity use it first for improvement in the farm home, and then later apply it to farm operations. After installing the lights, the most popular electrical appliances appear to be radios, irons, washing machines, refrigerators, toasters, vacuum cleaners, hot plates, and water system pumps, in that order.

## Civil Service Exams.

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations for the positions listed below. Applications must be on file with the Commission's Washington office not later than the closing dates mentioned below. All salaries given are subject to a retirement deduction of 3 1/2 per cent.

For the first five examinations the closing dates are September 26:

Assistant marketing specialist (fruits and vegetables, canned or frozen), \$2600 a year; also junior, \$2000 a year; Bureau of Agricultural Marketing Service, Department of Agriculture. Applicants must have had experience in the canning or freezing standardization and grading of canned or frozen fruits or vegetables. They must not have passed their fifty-third birthday.

Specialist in conference planning, \$4,600 a year, Office of Education, Federal Security Agency. Applicants must have had college education and experience in planning and conducting conferences, forums, and other activity of a similar nature. They must not have passed their fifty-third birthday.

Physical director, \$2,000 a year in the United States Veteran Administration. Applicants must completed a 4-year course in physical education and must have had experience in administering therapeutic exercises or conducting a physical education program in secondary schools. Applicants must not have passed

their forty-fifth birthday.

Physiotherapy aide, \$1,800 a year; also junior, \$1,620 a year United States Public Health Service, Federal Security Agency, and Veterans Administration. Applicants must not have passed their forty-fifth birthday. They must have had study in physiotherapy or physical education, or experience in physiotherapy work.

Senior scientific aide (taxidermy) \$2000 a year, United States National Museum, Smithsonian Institution. Applicants must have had certain technical museum and laboratory experience. College study in botany, geology and zoology may be substituted for part of the experience. Applicants must not have passed their fifty-third birthday.

Under mimeograph operator \$1260 a year for appointment in Washington D. C. only. Applicants must have had three months full time experience in the operation of mimeograph machines. They must have reached their eighteenth birthday, but not, have passed their fifty-third. Closing dates are September 14.

Full information as to the requirements of the positions, and application forms, may be obtained at the post office or customs house or post office or city with a first or second class post office, or from the Civil Service Commission at Washington.

The United States Marine Commission has announced an examination for Deck and Engine Cadets in the Merchant Marine of the United States. These positions are not under Civil Service and the register of eligibles will be maintained by the Maritime Commission. Applications must be filed with the Supervisor of Cadet Training, U. S. Maritime Commission, Washington, D. C. by October 15, 1940. Unmarried men between the ages of 18 and 25 who can produce evidence of good moral character will be eligible to compete for the examination. Rigid physical requirements must be met. Further information is contained in the formal announcement posted in first or second class post offices, also from the Maritime Commission in Washington, D. C.
