4-H CLUB MEMBERS TO GO TO FAIR

Some 80 4-H club members from Washington County will attend the Oregon State Fair which starts Labor Day, September 2, where they will enter in the neighborhood of 100 exhibits and take part in the judging and demonstration contests, according to an estimate made by Palmer Torvond, assistant county agent. These will be a part of over two thousand clubbers who are expected from throughout the state. A place has been provided on the grounds which will accommodate about 500 at a time. The attendance will be staggered so as to take care of the housing of the boys and girls.

Major contest interests this year are centered around the dairy production and dairy con-

sumption teams. State winners in these contests will be given an expense free trip to the National Dairy Show in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania this fall. Between 700 and 750 4-H club livestock exhibitors are expected at this year's fair. The second annual livestock auction will be held following the judging at which around 250 head of commercial baby beef, hams and hogs will be sold. Local butchers from the various counties are to take active part in this auction.

The Washington county delegation will leave after the close of the county fair. Some exhibits will be taken to Salem Saturday night and the remainder Sunday morning.

1. After working with water, my hands look wrinkled. Can I restore their smoothness quickly?

1. Wash your hands in a basin full of water, to which a little vinegar has been added. Dry your hands thoroughly with a soft towel.
2. Cut day-old slices of white bread into cubes, (remove crusts) and saute in a little butter until brown; or bake in the oven.
3. Try sugar cookie turnovers! Cut out rounds of cookie dough. Spread with mince meat. Fold over. Pinch edges together. Prick top with fork. Set temperature on your gas range oven at 350°. Bake 10 minutes, until delicately browned.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD PATTERNS WITH YOUR CAMERA



Light and shadow here created an interesting shadow pattern, which repeats the design of the ironwork. Watch for such patterns—they yield fascinating pictures.

EVERYBODY likes an interesting pattern—and there is an endless variety of patterns you can capture with your camera, if you watch for them.

Wherever light shines through something—such as an ornamental window, or railing—there may be a pattern of light and shadow. If shadows repeat the lines of some decorative ironwork, or the outline of a statue or fountain, opportunity exists for a picture. Observe such shadows—choose a position to show both the shadow and the object that creates it—and you'll usually get an interesting shot.

Whenever a number of similar objects are placed together, in a regular arrangement, you'll find patterns. A large tray of apples or oranges in front of the grocery store—stacks of crates or baskets at the market—piles of timber in a lumber yard—all these may yield good pattern effects that invite the attention of your camera.

Shoot a scene through an ornamental fence or window grille—and you have another type of pattern picture. The best type of grille is fairly open, so that it does not cut off too much of the scene. Expose for the distant parts of the view, and do not try to obtain detail in the grille—it is more effective if it appears as a dark outline.

In all these pattern pictures, use as small a lens opening as you can, so as to get a deeper zone of sharpness. If your lens will "stop down" to a very small opening—such as f/22—choose a high speed film for pattern shots and take advantage of the small lens opening.

Whenever you're outdoors on a sunny day, watch for pattern picture opportunities. Look for patterns indoors, too. Natural pattern effects occur everywhere—and pictures of them will lend variety to your collection.

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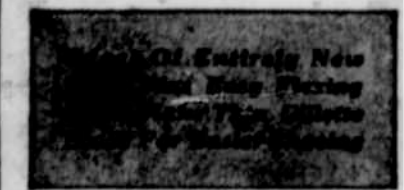
