WHO SHALL WE DRAFT?

In a radio address recently, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt is quoted as saying: "Elliott was not evading the draft. His eyes are bad and he can't see ten feet ahead of himself without his glasses."

Now isn't it strange that in news pictures of him taking his oath of office, there are no

glasses in evidence? Of course, we might not have seen clearly, not having our own glasses on at the time we saw the news reel. Anyway we did NOT see any glasses.

DEBUNKING THE DRAFTING OF OUR INDUSTRY

A whole lot has been said, and considerable written, about "drafting industry" in case the Government thinks its orders are not given the consideration the officials think they should receive. Or perhaps there seems to be a fear that industry will refuse to take orders from the Government Officials. Now isn't that something?

What business do you recall that refuses to take orders? That has so much business that is not glad to expand? Who among you has more than they want? Has a better home than he wants? Has more good clothes than he wants? Has more and better food than he wants? Has too many guns to fight with? Has too much of anything—only soft-spoken platitudes?

You who are registering this week, perhaps you will be given too many guns to fight with—too many beds to sleep on, too rich food to eat and (Oh! horrors!) will be paid too much salary—or is it wages? That is if the present regime continues.

But don't worry! We have allowed that sort of bunk for eight years. Are we going to keep right on swallowing it?

"You don't know what Willkie will do." Well, he can't be any more of a false prophet, any more of a "promiser," any more of a right-about-face that has occupied the White House the past seven years. Consider what he told you in 1932, what he told you in 1936, and consider what he did about it. Did he keep his word? Did he cut on Government expense? Did he reduce the number of Government employees? Did he make it any easier for the "little fellow" to go into business for himself? There are thousands of promises made in that smooth silver radio voice that were never kept and that there are some who believe he never intended to keep—that he knew he could not keep when he made them!

"Draft business," indeed. Why not some talk of drafting laziness and putting it to work? Some assurance that if you want to go into business you will be protected as promised in that Constitution Mr. Roosevelt took a solemn oath to "preserve, protect and defend"?

Did he ever read that Constitution which says that, "No person shall be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation"? Or does he think like the men of old that "The King can do no wrong"? And that all you have, life, liberty, everything belongs to the King? (the Government).

NO CHANGE HOPED FOR IN RADIO PROGRAMS

By some strange circumstance the radio gives out many things we don't seem to be able to understand. It is cluttered with advertising that would seemingly be barred from any legitimate newspaper. Or, if the paper did print any one of a number of such statements as are frequently heard over the ether the post-office authorities would bar the publication from the mails, and they would have a perfect right to do so.

We are prone to wonder if it is a sort of Government interference with business. And if it is, or not, it's dollars to donuts that the radio will never get rid of this sort of thing so long as that smooth, rippling radio voice gets free use of the ether waves. 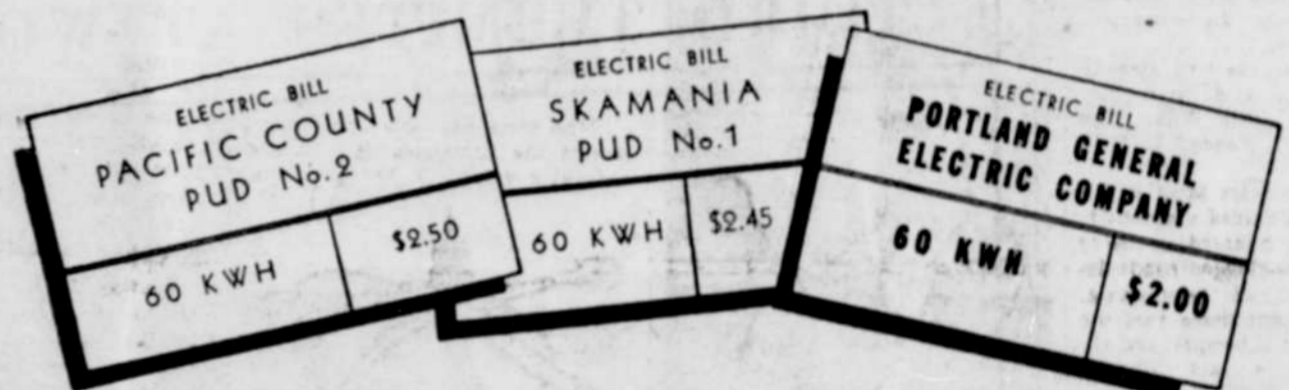
