One day, twenty-three years ago, the librarian in Rushville, Indiana, was talking to her young assistant about a tousel-haired young lawyer. "Marry that young man," advised Miss Mary Sleeth, the librarian. "He's going places."

The girl in the case had already made up her mind to do that. Her name was Miss Edith Wilk. The young lawyer was Wendell L. Willkie.

From the very start Miss Wilk's young man went places vigorously. Even though a blizzard, subzero weather and snow-clogged roads delayed the groom and the wedding, Wendell Willkie got there just the same—frozen bridal bouquet and all. It was January 14, 1918. Shortly afterward Wendell Willkie, already in the Army, left for France.

"Wendell Willkie has never let me down and that's the best recommendation I can give him," she says simply.

After Wendell Willkie had received the Republican nomination, a delegate remarked: "You've got the best man in the field."

"I have not," Mrs. Willkie countered, pleasantly, but firmly. "I have the best man in the world."

What has the great honor accorded her husband meant to this delightful, diminutive (she's only five feet, two, and weighs only about 110 pounds) Indiana woman? Has it frightened her? Inspired her? Probably both.

If her husband wants and hopes to be President, it's a pretty breath-taking, of course, but she is equal to the challenge. "I believe it's a woman's job to adjust herself to her husband's way of living and help him do what he wants," is her philosophy of marriage.

WOMEN ENLIST IN VOTE DRIVE FOR WILLKIE

Twenty years ago American women were preparing for their first vote in a presidential election.

In Detroit, two thousand women voters from 40 states, representative of 3,000 clubs under the banner of the National Federation of Women's Republican Clubs, gave testimonial to their 1940 political preparedness, and their enthusiasm for the 1940 magnetic Republican standard-bearer, Wendell Willkie.

With Miss Marion E. Martin, women's division director, Republican National Committee as their leader, Republican women workers were lined up for an intensive October "doorstep drive" to carry the plea for Republican Party candidates to every household in the country.

"Get every vote in the ballot box" is the rallying slogan, adopted by over one million workers in the "Women for Willkie" campaign.

In that Detroit meeting was the nucleus of the great army of workers, none of whose names evinced more interest and acclaim than a group of five distinguished wives—Mrs. Wendell Willkie, Mrs. Charles L. McNary, Mrs. Robert A. Taft, Mrs. Arthur H. Vandenberg and Mrs. Frank Gannett.

Cost of New Deal.

Drys Win In South

August 27th, this year, South Carolina gave a majority of 58,995 in a state-wide contest. For the first time in fifty years, in 1934 the state had gone wet, the majority being 24,531. This marked change in seven years tells the swing back in public sentiment.

"Since 1934, under the wet rule taxes increased \$28,000,000; bootlegging and liquor law violations increased 51%; crime 40%; insanity increased so fast as to compel the erection of 3 additional buildings to the state hospital. Public debt increased 45%; auto deaths, 16½% in 4 months and 150% in 7 years. Businessmen found that legalized liquor was robbing legitimate industry of more than 25,000,000 a year, the greater part of it going out of the state to "foreign distillers and brewers." Of the 10,800 elections held since repeal, the drys have won 6,950. With the Carolina legislature acting on the recent vote, four states will then be totally dry. In Kansas, the High School, Y. P. did much toward the big job of making the dry victory. And to top it all, the U.S. Supreme Court has rendered a decision that forbids the shipment of wet goods into dry territory.
