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AMERICANISM

WATCH YOUR LAWMAKERS

Today's public attention is on National politics. That should not result in a general disinterest in local elections and the local Government. Local policies which will be made in our state Capitol are of the utmost and immediate interest to all.

Next year will be legislative year and if past precedent is an ardent, the legislature will be deluged with proposed laws—good, bad, indifferent, and just plain crack-pot, and every law passed will, in one way or another, affect the well-being of every man and woman in Oregon. When the Legislature convenes as it must—scrutinize every law—make your wishes known to the members of the Legislature and in this manner protect your own pocket book.

HEALTH AND MEDICAL PREPAREDNESS

Until recent months we could expect aid from medical discoveries in our sister democracies. Now, in this country, alone, we must carry the burden. As yet we have not gone forward with it. When armies are mobilized certain proven immunizations are used. Typhoid fever, yes; smallpox, yes—since Jenner's discovery of more than 100 yrs. ago. Recently there has been developed a toxoid against tetanus of proven value and will be used routinely. Effective immunization against gas gangrene would be another great aid. By a few months of co-operative co-ordinated effort on the part of commercial, university and governmental groups, a practical protection against this major war hazard should be perfected. Here is a job for a co-ordinator.

Our first concern may well be in tropical America. What about yellow fever? prevalent throughout large areas of South

America, a constant threat to the southern half of these United States. We do not have vaccine enough in this country to even one regiment! In spite of requests from year to year, we have not been able to secure funds with which to procure a reserve supply.

These few examples are among many that could be cited, illustrate a major thesis. There are many diseases, of great military importance which we could control if we were given the will, the authority, and the money to do it.

If, and when, war comes, every 1,000,000 men mobilized will need 7,500 doctors drawn from civil practice. Dentists, nurses, and sanitary engineers will be needed too. In mobilizing four million men during the last war more than a fourth of the effective medical men of the country were called to the colors. Whole counties were depleted of doctors. Many medical schools were almost put out of business because their best men left for military duty. We should not repeat these mistakes. Today we should investigate who should go and who should stay to operate an effective and essential civilian service.

How big an appetite does a PUD have when it crowds up to the tax trough—and begins feeding on your dollars? If you want to find out, just read what has happened in other Oregon and Washington counties where PUDs have been organized.

\$40,564 Legal Fees, Traveling, Etc.!

Pacific County PUD collected \$40,564 in taxes before it spent a dime for electric properties. Most of this fund went for legal fees and traveling expenses of the three commissioners. It paid \$489,000 for electric properties but floated \$690,000 in bonds; and an additional \$35,000 in bonds has been authorized, or \$234,000 in excess of the purchase price of the electric properties.

\$79,000 Bonds for \$40,000 Property.

Skamania County PUD paid \$40,000 for electric properties—but floated a \$79,000 bond issue. Further, it collected a full 2 mill tax on all properties in the district. Despite this large tax subsidy plus "at-site" purchases of Bonneville power, Skamania PUD rates are higher for the average family than present PGE rates.

PUD Tax \$10 Per Customer.

Wahkiakum County PUD has collected funds from taxpayers amounting to \$11,089—more than \$10 per each electric customer in the county.

Nothing to Show for \$7,644.73 New Taxes.

For seven years the Tillamook PUD has been spending taxpayers' money (total, \$7,644.73)—but it still has no utility property. Now PUD directors are asking voters to approve a \$750,000 bond issue.

\$250,000 Rake-Off Looms for Fiscal Agent.

Clark County PUD is squeezing \$41,000 from the taxpayers this year—spending it for attorneys, engineers, etc. It has signed an agreement to pay a fiscal agent up to \$250,000 if he effects the sale of private property to the district. The PUD does not own or operate any utility property.

\$91,548 for Lawyers Fees, Engineers, Etc.

Cowlitz County PUD has collected \$91,548 in general property taxes and has spent most of it "investigating". It still owns no electric property.

\$508,000 of "Water."

Grays Harbor PUD paid \$2,842,000 for electric properties, but floated a \$3,350,000 bond issue for the deal—leaving \$508,000 of "water". On top of this, the PUD gobbled \$44,204 in taxes this year, and earmarked \$103,000 of bond money "to provide for engineering, fiscal, legal and other fees and expenses incident to the acquisition of these properties."

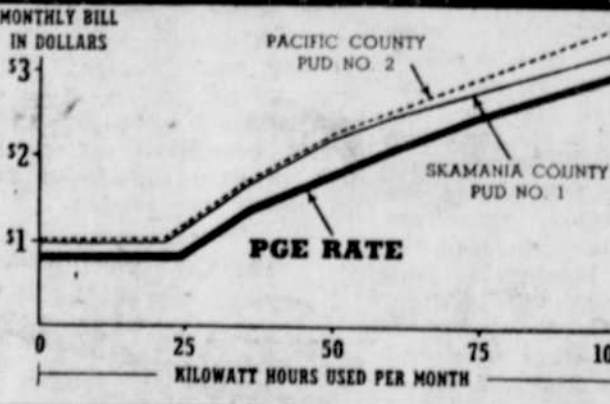
