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AMERICANISM

"Americanism is unflinching love of country; loyalty to its institutions and ideals; eagerness to defend it against all enemies; undivided allegiance to the flag; and a desire to secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity."

Lots of talk these days about the Democracies, and this democracy of Ours, and so on ad infinitum. And what does it all mean? We wonder. Is this a Democracy? How long has it been one? What is a Democracy, anyway? Let's consult Webster.

DEMOCRACY—Government by the people; a form of government in which the supreme power is retained by the people and exercised either directly or indirectly through a system of representation and delegated authority periodically renewed. In Oregon through the initiative and referendum the people have a hand in governing. But that authority is not exercised very thoroughly. What will you, Mr. Voter, have to say about what the legislature passes on during the coming session of that body?

But we are wandering. In that great document which at least an attempt is being made to relegate to "horse and buggy days" we do not find any mention of democracy. But we do find mention of a republic. And why not some great leader to lead us and show us what a republic is?

Here is what Webster says: (1) Republic—Commonwealth, the state. (2) A state in which the sovereign power resides in a certain body of the people and is exercised by representatives elected by, and (in theory at least) responsible to them.

In general a democracy is a government in which the sovereign power is vested in and exercised by all the people. A republic is a state in which the sovereign power is exercised by representatives chosen by the people.

Now, which sort is our kind of government? A democracy or a republic? I leave it to you.

OIL DIP REQUIRED FOR INFESTED HOLLY

Before infested holly can be shipped out of Oregon, it must be treated with an oil dip, the State Department of Agriculture reports. One hundred gallons of the dip requires two gallons of medium, summer oil and 98 gallons of water. A half pound of

Pomo or Vatsol as a detergent is not required but adds to oil coverage and kill.

The method of using the formula, which should be fresh, is to dip three minutes, drain five minutes, wash in and out of fresh water.

S. O. S. Brings Help

Here is an old saying, "God helps those who help themselves." A lot of folks think this to be a verse out of the Bible. But try to find it and you get but two passages that have the word, "helps." 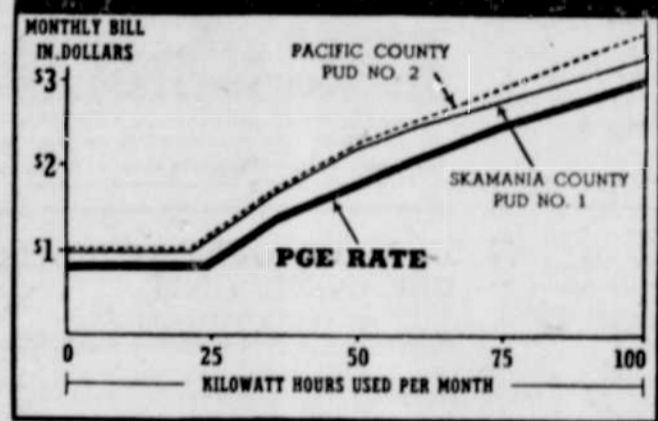
Why Gamble with the 8 PUD Risks?

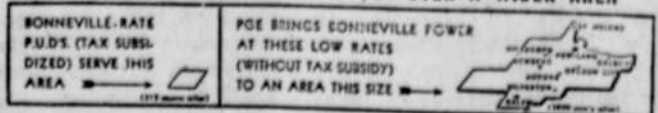
