SELECTIVE DRAFT NUMBERS DRAWN

The first two serial numbers to be drawn in that now famous lottery (the wonder of the authorities will bar this issue from the mails for mentioning "lottery" this time) were held by Washington county residents. Ralph Gillmore of Seerwood Route 3, drew the first chance to get called for service, and Vincent Oscar Leach of Buxton held the other number 158. Holding number 192 we find Leonard Eaton of Route 8, Portland and Alfred Avery Rhyme of Rhyme camp near Glenwood.

No information has been received as to what these four men will do but the Army recruiting service reports that the number of men making up this county's quota has already volunteered. If current reports are true, it is quite probable that this county will be left out when the draftees are ordered to report for service.

Reclamation Head Reports

Completion of reclamation projects now under construction in Oregon will help relieve the pressure in western irrigation states as a result of the westward migration from the prairie states, said John C. Page, commissioner of the federal bureau of reclamation, in a special message to the recent Oregon reclamation congress meeting in Klamath Falls.

The Deschutes project, now being completed, with the construction of the new Wickiup dam, will offer opportunity for a home and livelihood to perhaps 1,000 additional families in this state, said the Commissioner. The regional planning commission for the Pacific northwest estimates that in the last decade, 400,000 persons have migrated into Oregon, Washington Idaho and that part of Montana west of the Continental Divide.

The Wickiup dam, now being constructed, largely by CCC labor, will store water for the irrigation of about 50,000 acres of select lands in the vicinity of Madras and Culver. It will also provide a supplemental supply for 47,500 acres for Crane Prairie storage, the Commissioner pointed out. The Crane Prairie dam, which is just above the Wickiup dam on the head waters of the Deschutes, is already complete.

"It is worthy of mention that these two dams will add 230,000 acre-feet to the 2 1/2 million acre-feet of developed reservoir storage capacity in Oregon. Reclamation projects in the state today are capable of providing a full supply of irrigation water for 161,983 acres of land and a supplemental supply for 136,483 acres, or a total of nearly 300,000 acres."

The Reclamation congress adopted a resolution asking that in the interest of national defense, and for other reasons, engineering studies be made of the state to determine whether additional reclamation is feasible, reports Dr. W. L. Powers, secretary of the congress and head of the OSC soils department.

Commissioner Page estimates that Oregon has enough unused water to irrigate new land and to supplement existing systems to the extent of 1,410,000 acres.

MIXED WHEAT IS WHEAT ACREAGE

Wheat growers of Washington County should bear in mind that present regulations for 1941 are so drawn that any acreage of wheat seeded with other grains that may be harvested for grain in 1941 will be considered as wheat acreage. The Western Division of the AAA has ruled that in 1941 any mixtures containing wheat will be considered as acreage planted to wheat. Recommendations that this ruling be modified has been made by the Oregon committee but no definite ruling as to modification has as yet been made. This announcement is of some importance to local farmers because it means that to be sure that they are within the allotted acreage, that their acreage seeded to any mixture containing wheat as well as the wheat acreage will need to be kept within the wheat acreage allotment for the farm.

FIELD CORN GIVES GOOD
McMinnville—Both hybrid and open pollinated field corn have given some outstanding yields in Yamhill county this year, reports Rex Warren, county agent, who

assisted growers in keeping accurate records of varietal trials. On the Sred Muhs farm, Wisconsin Hybrid No 455 gave the best yield for silage purposes, with a production of 17,000 lbs. per acre, which 25% was corn. On the Chester Mulkey farm, a good yield of No. 13 corn yielded at the rate of 90 bushels of weeks earlier than Wisconsin Hybrid No. 332 where it matured at least three weeks per acre after adjusting
