Over Her Dead Body

Time: 11:30 on a day not too long ago.

And what did the minister have to say over the remains of this stranger? To begin with he quoted from the Twenty-Third Psalm— "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want." Then he told of how dogs and cats and cows and horses can all find the way home. But the poor sheep is helpless; it must be brought back to the shelter. It needs a shepherd.

Then came—"All we like sheep have gone astray," and the merciful God saw our need and sent His Son to shepherd us. Followed that, the thought in Christ's own words that Christ calleth His own sheep by name and leadeth them out. "By Me, if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture." So adds the passage from Christ's own lips.

From this the preacher went on to tell how Jesus broke up every funeral that came near. There was the case of the only son of a widowed mother at the gates of the city of Nain. Jesus and a great company of His disciples came square against the procession coming out. And the Lord had compassion on his mother and said: "Weep not. And He came and touched the bier and they that bare him stood still. And he said, 'Young man, I say unto thee, arise! And He that was dead sat up and began to speak. And He delivered him to his mother.'"

The words closed with a picture of that great day when Christ is to raise from the grave all who quit self-goodness to put their trust in Him. The verses read: The Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of an archangel, and with the trump of God; and the dead in Christ shall rise first; then we who are alive and remain—i.e., His own still living here on earth at the time,—these shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air; and so shall we ever be with the Lord.

When the preacher of your funeral sermon looks toward the casket, may he be able to say that on a day you confessed yourself a sinner and lost and that you chose as your Lord and

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The Cook's Nook

NOVEMBER

No warmth, no cheerfulness no healthful ease,
No comfortable feel in any member;
No shade, no shine, no butterflies, no bees,
No fruits, no flowers, no leaves, no birds—
No - vember! Thos Hood, 1884

Hood was wrong when he quipped his heartfelt stanza (above) according to local home-makers approached on the subject. November, in the words of good cooks, is one of the best-eating months!

Hood, they say, might have had his "warmth, his cheerfulness and heartfelt ease" in a fragrant cup of coffee; could have actually eaten his "shade and sunshine" in a shadowy-with-chocolate cake; might even have had butterflies November or no, if he'd known to ask the meat man for butterfly chops, could certainly have had bees' offerings and flowers and birds!

Coffee For Comfortable Feelings

1. Use fresh coffee. Never buy more than a week's supply, and keep it securely covered.
2. Use enough coffee. One heaping teaspoonful to each cup of water is standard.
3. Serve coffee fresh, as soon as possible after making. Never re-heat.
4. Keep coffee making equipment clean.

Shade and Shine Cake

2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoonfuls all-phosphate baking powder
1/2 teaspoonful salt
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup shortening
2 eggs well beaten
1/2 cup of milk
1 teaspoonful vanilla
1 square chocolate melted
Mix and sift flour, baking powder

and salt. Cream shortening, add sugar slowly, cream until fluffy. Stir in eggs. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk, stirring well after each addition. Add flavoring. Divide the batter in 2 parts; to one part add melted chocolate. Drop batters alternately by tablespoonfuls into oiled 8" x 4" loaf pan and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour. Frost with this

Glossy Frosting:
Mix 1 unbeaten egg white with 1/2 cup of sugar, 3 tbsps. water and 1 teasp. light corn syrup in top of double boiler. Beat with rotary beater until dissolved. Place over boiling water, cook, beating constantly 5 minutes, or until frosting will stand in peaks. Remove from the heat; add vanilla. Makes enough frosting to cover a loaf 8"x4".

Dressing For Butterfly Chops
Have your meat-man cut the chops into butterflies by opening out flat double slices from boned loin of pork. Serve them with a corn-bran dressing like this:

4 cups soft bread crumbs
1 cup all-bran
1 tablespoonful chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped celery
2 tablespoonfuls fat
1/2 teaspoonful pepper
1/2 teaspoonful poultry seasoning
1 cup drained whole-kernel corn
1 cup stock liquid from corn or milk
4 butterfly pork chops
1/2 teaspoonful salt

Combine bread crumbs and all bran. Cook onion and celery and fat until lightly browned; add to bread mixture with seasonings, corn and stock. Mix thoroughly. Press into baking dish, 8" in diameter. Arrange chops on top

of dressing and sprinkle with salt. Cover; bake in moderately hot oven (375° F.) about 45 minutes; uncover and bake 15 minutes longer. Serves four.

Florida Honey-Bee Muffins
1/2 cup sifted flour
2 tbsls. sugar
1/2 teaspoonful salt
1 1/2 teaspoonfuls baking powder
1/2 cup whole wheat flour
1 egg, well beaten
1/4 cup orange juice
1 teaspoonful grater orange rind
1/3 cup honey
3 tbsps. shortening, melted
Sift flour once, measure, add sugar, salt, and baking powder and sift again. Add whole wheat flour and mix thoroughly. Combine egg, orange juice and rind, honey and shortening. Add all at once to flour stirring only enough to dampen all the flour. Bake in well-greased 2" muffin pans in hot oven (400° F.) 15 to 20 minutes or until browned. Carefully remove muffins from pans as they have a tendency to stick. Approximate yield, 12 muffins.

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
