COUNTY GETS CORN SHOW RIBBONS

Champion and sweepstakes ribbons and trophy for an exhibit of hybrid corn were won by Clayton Nyberg of Tualatin at the State Corn show held in Corvallis last week. Washington county 4-H club members also returned with a goodly share of the awards, reports Palmer Torvend, assistant county agent. Stanley Hergert of Hillsboro placed first in the 4-H corn judging contest and the Washington county team composed of Hergert, Clayton Nyberg, and Joe Santoro won first in the county competition in which Linn county placed second and Clackamas county third.

Mrs. Max Berger of Beaverton received the first award in the open pollinated varieties with an exhibit of Minnesota 13; Max Berger placed seventh and Joe Berger tenth. Frank Setniker, Sr., placed eighth in this group. Willis Nyberg of Tualatin placed third with his exhibit of hybrid corn and Ed. Seus of Hillsboro sixth.

In the 4-H exhibit of ten ears of open pollinated corn, Washington county 4-H club members won the following awards: Stanley Hergert, Hillsboro, fourth; James Kincheles, Beaverton, fifth; Myron Bish, Sherwood, sixth; Jerry Schwanke, Cornelius, seventh; Jose Santoro, Beaverton, eighth; and Dick True, twenty exhibits from this county were entered in the show, twelve of which were from 4-H members.

The State Corn show winds up the 4-H contests for the year and club members are getting busy with their projects for the 1941 season.

For the fourth consecutive month, Washington county stood at the head of the nine counties in the first division of the -949 Counties Traffic Safety contest at the end of October, according to standings computed today by Earl Snell, Secretary of State and sponsor of the contest.

In the second division Linn county was in first place for the second consecutive month and in the third division, Union county stood in first place. Counties are grouped according to population density for the contest and standings are based on the percentage of improvement as shown in the number of accidents, injuries and deaths as compared with the same period last year.

Complete standings were as follows:

Division one—Washington, 1st; Yamhill, 2nd; Clackamas, 3rd; Marion, 4th; Clatsop, 5th; Benton 6th; Columbia, 7th; Polk, 8th; and Multnomah, 9th.

Division two—Linn, 1st; Hood River, 2nd; Coos, 3rd; Lincoln, 4th; Lane, 5th; Tillamook, 6th; and Jackson, 7th.

Division three—Union, 1st; Deschutes, 2nd; Umatilla, 3rd; Baker, 4th; Douglas, 5th; Wasco, 6th; Klamath, 7th; Josephine, 8th.

The six counties, Crook, Gilliam, Jefferson, Morrow, Sherman, and Wallowa continued to have deathless records so far this year. Fatalities to date total 280 compared to 259 for the first ten months of 1939.

Interest in Oregon traffic safety publications has spread widely over the nation, it was revealed at the Secretary of State's Office today.

Earl Snell, Secretary of State, received a postcard from a woman in Williamsport, Tennessee, requesting copies of Oregon's safety publications. She had seen one of them and desired more for use in her state, she said.

DISTRICT REPORTS MANY RECRUITS

The Oregon recruiting district has enlisted 167 young men in the first three weeks of November, according to a recent announcement from district headquarters in Portland. This group included men from all central points in Oregon and southwestern Washington.

During the week of selective service induction, the personnel of the recruiting service were on duty at the induction stations and sub-stations of the Oregon district were temporarily closed. All these sub-stations are now re-opened, and according to Lt. Col. B. H. Hensley, district recruiting officer, recruiting for 3-year enlistments in the various branches of the regular army continues as strongly as ever.

Vacancies for qualified men in air corps, infantry, medical department, quartermaster corps, coast artillery, field artillery, and engineer corps are available.
