hood diseases, killing more than either diphheria or scarlet fever. It retreats somewhat during the years between five and the early



Broil Franks and Spaghetti



The popular quick meal of frankfurters and spaghetti has more appetite appeal when prepared in the broiler under the live flame; and it is practically effortless during the cooking period in the smokeless broiler of a modern gas range. Turn food once, that's all the attention needed.

Preheat the broiler and transfer the contents of a can of spaghetti in tomato sauce to the receiving tray of the broiler, as pictured. Pierce the frankfurters and wrap each with a strip of bacon, securing the ends with wooden picks. Arrange on broiler rack with halves of grapefruit, sprinkled with sugar and a few seedless raisins; dot with butter.

Broil the food just long enough for the bacon around the franks to cook on the top side; then turn and continue broiling until the bacon is browned. The rest of the food will be ready to serve at the same time...
